ADMISSION TO THE FAIR

The gates will be open at 8 a.m. on each day at which time every officer and employee is expected to be at his post of duty. If you do not have a Membership, Exhibitor, Jr. Fair Pass, Season Pass, Ohio Fair Managers Pass or Pass Ticket for Concession people, you will have to buy a General Admission Ticket or Tickets at one of the Ticket Booths. Everyone from 8 years and up will have to buy some sort of ticket. **Rides and Grandstand admission are not included** in any admission price!! **LOST PASSES WILL NOT BE REPLACED! NO REFUNDS!**

MEMBERSHIP TICKET – 6 days admission to the fairgrounds.....\$30.00

Camping

Fair Week Camping –

The Wyandot County Fair Trailer Parks will consist of four parks.

- The south park, in the grove
- The north trailer park, north of the 4-H horse barn
- The east trailer park, east of the goat and pony barn
- The west park, along Ohio 53, which will be available to overnight campers with fair employment.

All campers must return their contract by July 1, with payment of \$230.00. This fee includes the camper space plus one fair pass in the name that is on the contract. If a second car pass is needed you will have to provide proof of a second fair pass and the license plate number of the vehicle to the office before September 1st.

Each lot provides for a camping outfit and one car.

Electricity and water are furnished.

No camper can be moved onto their assigned lot before the Thursday before the fair unless special permission has been granted from a superintendent in charge. No electric will be turned on until Thursday before the fair.

All rented camping sited **must** have a camper on the site. It can not be used for just parking & fair supplies.

No refunds after August 15th.

**ABSOLUTELY NO CAMPING/OVERNIGHTING IN LIVESTOCK TRAILERS
NO UNAUTHORIZED GOLF CARTS WILL BE PERMITTED ON THE
FAIRGROUNDS AFTER 10 A.M. DURING THE FAIR.**

**The Wyandot County Agricultural Society Insurance Policy requires each camper
contract provide a copy of their insurance policy to the fair office.**

Fairgrounds Camping –

Cost for **off season** camping is \$35.00 per day for full camping
\$10.00 per day for primitive (**no** water & electric)

All camping units and names of occupants remaining overnight must be registered at the secretary's office.

Each camping group must include a supervising adult. Any individual or group causing a disturbance will be removed from the fairgrounds along with their vehicle, if any, with no money being refunded.

ALL DOGS MUST BE KEPT ON SHORT LEASH.

OFF SEASON CAMPING RATES -

\$35 per day for full camping - includes water and electric

\$10 per day for primitive camping (**no** water & electric)

FAIR WEEK

Fair Week - \$230.00 full camping - includes water, electric & 1 fair pass

CAMPING RULES AND REGULATIONS

Forfeiture of future camping privileges may be made at the discretion of the Wyandot County Fair Board.

ADMINISTRATIVE CODE STATES;

- ADEQUATE FACILITIES SHALL BE PROVIDED FOR THE COLLECTION OF ALL SEWAGE AND LIQUID WASTE IN THE PARK/CAMPS.
- ALL SEWAGE AND LIQUID WASTE COLLECTION SYSTEMS SHALL BE MAINTAINED IN A SAFE AND SANITARY MANNER SO AS NOT TO CREATE A HEALTH HAZARD.
- ALL SITES SHALL BE MAINTAINED FREE OF SEWAGE AND LIQUID WASTE NUISANCES.
- WHEN LIQUID WASTE IS COLLECTED AT AN INDIVIDUAL SITE, IT SHALL BE COLLECTED AND STORED IN A CLOSED CONTAINER.
- THE OPERATOR SHALL NOT PERMIT ANY INDIVIDUAL WITHIN THE PARK/CAMP TO CREATE A SEWAGE OR LIQUID WASTE NUISANCE.
- NO GENERATORS CAN BE RUN ON CAMPING SPACES.
- NO SOAP WATER, OTHER LIQUID WASTE OR HUMAN WASTE CAN BE PLACED ON THE GROUND.

IF ANYONE IS FOUND DOING THIS THEY WILL BE ASKED TO LEAVE THE FAIR GROUNDS IMMEDIATELY. IT IS THE RESPONSIBILITY OF THE FAIR BOARD TO SEE THAT EVERYONE, CONCESSIONAIRES AND CAMPERS, COMPLY WITH THESE RULES. CONTINUOUS VIOLATIONS WILL RESULT IN THE WYANDOT COUNTY HEALTH DEPARTMENT PROHIBITING CAMPING ON THE FAIR GROUNDS. THE WYANDOT COUNTY FAIR BOARD SINCERELY HOPES THAT EVERYONE WILL COMPLY WITH THESE RULES THIS YEAR AND IN THE FUTURE. THE WYANDOT COUNTY FAIR IS ONE OF THE NICEST FAIRS IN THE STATE. PLEASE HELP US KEEP IT THAT WAY.

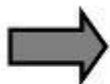

CONSTITUTION OF THE WYANDOT COUNTY AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY

ARTICLE I. This organization shall be known by the name of the Wyandot County Agricultural Society, and its object is to promote and encourage agriculture, horticulture and stock raising; together with all other industrial and educational interests of the county.

ARTICLE II. Section 1. The Board of Directors shall consist of 21 (twenty one) members. (1) one from each township plus 8 at large, with no limit on the number from any one township. The directors shall be elected for the term of 3 (three) years and so arranged that one-third (1/3) of the members shall be elected each year. All directors must be members of the society.

Section 2. The annual election of members of the board of directors shall be held on the grounds of the Wyandot County Agricultural Society on the Saturday during the fair between the hours of noon and 4 p.m.

Article III. Section 1. Any resident of Wyandot County 18 years of age and over who has purchased a membership ticket is entitled to vote for directors of the agricultural society.

Section 2. Membership tickets may be purchased at any time throughout the year until the first day of the fair at the secretary’s office.

Section 3. Members of the Wyandot County Agricultural Society must declare their candidacy for the office of a director of the society by filing a petition signed by 10 or more current year members. The petition must be filed with the secretary of the society at least 10 (ten) days before the annual election. Only candidates who have met the filing requirements will be eligible for election as a director.

Section 4. Blank petitions shall be furnished by the agricultural society and shall be obtained from the secretary of the society.

Section 5. The board of directors shall meet annually in November for the purpose of electing all officers. The term of director shall start on the 15th day of November of the year elected. The term of office shall start immediately after the election.

Section 6. The secretary shall be employed by the board of directors for a term not to exceed three years and may or may not be a member of the board of directors but must be a member of the society. The treasurer shall be employed by the board for a term of one year and be a member of the society. All other officers shall be elected for a term of one year and be members of the board of directors.

Section 7. All officers shall hold their offices until their successors are elected and qualified.

ARTICLE IV. The president and vice president shall be members of the board of directors. The president of the society shall preside at all meetings of the society and of the board, and

discharge such other duties as pertain to his office, and in his absence the vice president shall discharge the duties of his office.

ARTICLE V. The secretary shall keep a roll of members and conduct the correspondence of the society. He shall make a careful record of all meetings and all business done by the board of directors, together with the report of all committees appointed, and place such reports on file in a book kept for such purposes. He shall keep a book showing an account of all monies coming to said board from which and from what source it came. He shall also keep an itemized account of all money paid out for what purpose. He shall receive all monies due or coming to said board and pay the same to the treasurer, and take a receipt for the same and perform such duties as prescribed by the state board of agriculture and receive such compensations as fixed by the board of directors.

ARTICLE VI. The treasurer shall receive all monies from the secretary collected for membership fees or otherwise; also he shall receive all monies from tickets sold during exhibition of the society, and make an annual report to the board of directors at the regular annual meeting and receive such compensation as fixed by the board of directors.

ARTICLE VII. A list of articles for which premiums are to be awarded shall be published in premium list in accordance with such rules and regulations as the board of directors may prescribe.

ARTICLE VIII. All articles offered for premiums shall be in accordance with such rules and regulations as the board of directors may prescribe.

ARTICLE IX. Such superintendents of the various departments as the board of directors deem necessary shall be appointed by the president and confirmed by the board of directors.

ARTICLE X. It shall be the duty of the society to arrange for security to protect property and exhibits.

ARTICLE XI. "No person shall be permitted to make solicitations of any nature on the fairgrounds except in contracted concession or commercial rented spaces. No person will be permitted to post or display signs, distribute handbills or advertise material or sell or distribute free, any merchandise, except persons under contract."

CODE OF CONDUCT

This Code of Conduct applies to anyone attending events or activities on the Wyandot County Fairgrounds as an exhibitor, advisor, volunteer, parent, spectator, visitor, superintendent, judge, committee member, fair official, vendor, camper, or any family member or invitee of any individual on the fairgrounds.

All persons on the fairgrounds must conduct themselves in a manner consistent with this Code of Conduct and according to the Rules and Regulations of the Wyandot County Agricultural Society, dba Wyandot County Fair.

Consequences of violating this code of conduct may include, but are not limited to the following penalties:

- Verbal warning
- Written warning
- Removal from Fairgrounds
- Suspension, reduction and/or loss of premiums
- Suspension, reduction and/or loss of auction proceeds
- Loss of future show privileges
- Loss of privilege to be on Fairground property

The seriousness of the offense, as determined by the Wyandot County Senior Fair Board, shall determine the penalty applied to the offender.

The act of making an entry in the fair, participating in events on the fairgrounds, and/or attending events on the Wyandot County Fairgrounds is confirmation that you will abide by the Code of Conduct, and that you understand the consequences of a violation of the Code of Conduct and the penalties for a violation of the Code of Conduct.

EXHIBITORS, ADVISORS, VOLUNTEERS, PARENTS, FAMILY MEMBERS, SPECTATORS, SUPERINTENDENTS, JUDGES, COMMITTEE MEMBERS, FAIR OFFICIALS, VISITORS, FAMILY MEMBERS AND INVITEES MUST:

- Be responsible for your own behavior on the Fairgrounds, and accept consequences for inappropriate behavior.
- Support and abide by the rules set forth by the Fair Board, Superintendents, Committees and Clubs.
- Practice good citizenship, leadership and self-governance.
- Follow the direction of staff.
- Demonstrate positive sportsmanship at all times.
- Be courteous and respectful to others.
- Use appropriate language at all times.
- Respect and adhere to guidelines of the Wyandot County Fair Code of Conduct and all rules and regulations that apply to participation/competition.
- Follow all laws of the State of Ohio

THE FOLLOWING BEHAVIOR, CONDUCT AND ACTIVITIES ARE NOT PERMITTED AT EVENTS HELD AT THE WYANDOT COUNTY FAIRGROUNDS AND AT OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY EXTENSION ACTIVITIES RELATED TO THE WYANDOT COUNTY FAIR, AND SHALL BE CONSIDERED A VIOLATION OF THE CODE OF CONDUCT:

- Disrespect for participants, volunteers, staff, leaders, or spectators of an event
- Confrontation of any judge, participant, advisor, or spectator at a show or exhibit
- Unethical and/or immoral conduct
- Improper language (profanity)
- Bullying, intimidation, belittling

- Excessive consumption of alcohol
- Possession or consumption of illegal drugs including the use of tobacco by a minor
- Improper use of weapons or fireworks
- Possession or use of harmful objects with the intent to harm or intimidate others.
- Destruction, defacing, or damage of property
- Violation of established curfew
- Postings, listings, pictures, signs or flyers that are deemed inappropriate on Fair grounds or social media forums related to the fairgrounds.

The list is not exhaustive, and other types of behavior, conduct, or incidents may also be considered a violation of the Code of Conduct, in the discretion of the Wyandot County Fair Board.

THE WYANDOT COUNTY AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY DBA WYANDOT COUNTY FAIR BOARD RESERVES THE RIGHT TO REMOVE ANY PERSON FROM THE GROUNDS WHO VIOLATES THE CODE OF CONDUCT OR ANY OTHER RULES OR REGULATIONS THAT APPLY, IN THEIR SOLE DISCRETION.

THE WYANDOT COUNTY AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY DBA WYANDOT COUNTY FAIR BOARD RESERVES THE RIGHT TO AMEND, CHANGE OR ADD TO THESE RULES AND REGULATIONS AS THEY DEEM ADVISABLE. ALL DECISIONS OF THE WYANDOT COUNTY FAIR BOARD ARE FINAL.



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BYLAWS

A majority of the members of the board of directors shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

The regular meetings of the board shall be set by the board during the November meeting each year. Special meetings may be called as often as necessary.

Exhibitors, not residents of Wyandot County, upon purchase of an exhibitor ticket shall be entitled to compete for premiums, but must conform to and be governed by the rules of the Wyandot County Agricultural Society, and State Department of Agriculture of Ohio. Any person, a resident of Wyandot County, may compete for premiums in any department, or make an exhibit by purchasing a membership ticket, and complying to the rules of the Wyandot County Agricultural Society and State Department of Agriculture of Ohio.

ALL ARTICLES ENTERED FOR PERMIUMS MUST BE IN THE NAME OF THE BONAFIDE OWNER.

Any member of the board who shall, by virtue of his official position, use any means to defeat an impartial reward shall, on conviction thereof, forfeit his membership, and the board shall appoint his successor.

Any person who, by letter or otherwise, attempts to interfere with the committees during their adjustments, will be excluded from competition, and if the premium in anyway has, in the opinion of the board of directors, been obtained by fraud such premiums shall be withheld.

Protests made of the violations of these rules must be submitted in writing, accompanied by a \$75 fee, and presented to the secretary's office no later than the next regular meeting. If the protest is upheld by a majority vote of the directors, the fee will be returned. If the protest is denied, the fee is forfeited.

Diligence will be used by the board to prevent injury to or loss of property, but they will not be responsible for any damage, injury or loss that may occur.

If any disrespect is shown to the award or to the awarding committee by the exhibitor or his agent he shall forfeit all the awards made to him, and it shall be the duty of the member in charge to report the same to the board at its first subsequent meeting.

Premium cards have no values as to the payment of premiums, as premiums are paid only by the records of the judges' book and from which there shall be no appeal.

No ribbons or awards of any description will be allowed in any livestock barn until all judging in that department is completed.

Concessions and exhibitors shall have all supplies delivered to their space before 10 a.m. each day.

All bills other than regular bills for material, labor, etc., must be signed by the person or people ordering same if ok, if not correct must be brought before the board of directors, if not so signed not to be paid. No order given on the treasury until so signed.

This constitution and bylaws may be amended by a majority of the board of directors at a scheduled meeting voting in favor of placing an amendment on the ballot at the annual election.

5. PLEASE CHECK WITH CONCESSION LOCATORS TO BE SPOTTED. FRONT FOOTAGE USED WILL BE MEASURED AND CONTRACT ADJUSTED ACCORDINGLY. **WYANDOT COUNTY AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY RESERVES THE RIGHT TO RELOCATE VENDOR FROM PREVIOUS YEAR.** The Society makes no warranties as to the suitability, security, or otherwise of the rental space. The lessee accepts the rental space “AS IS”, TO HAVE AND TO HOLD the described unit(s) or space(s) on the contract for the inclusive dates of the present years fair. Property is only for your use during the present years fair. After that the booths will be subject to rental by others.
- 6. A DEPOSIT OF \$100.00 PER SPACE WILL BE DUE JUNE 1ST. IF WE DO NOT RECEIVE YOUR CONTRACT OR HEAR FROM YOU BY THIS DATE YOUR CONTRACT IS FORFEITED. WE WILL NOT CONTACT YOU!**

26. PA SYSTEMS IN BUILDINGS OR TENTS AND OUTSIDELOCATIONS ONLY WITH PERMISSION OF CONCESSIONS COMMITTEE. NO CONCESSIONAIRE WILL BE ALLOWED TO USE FAIRGROUNDS PA FOR ANNOUCEMENTS.

27. CONCESSIONAIRE'S DOGS MUST BE CONFINED TO CAMPING AREA.

28. CONCESSIONAIRES AND EXHIBITORS SHALL CARRY THEIR OWN LIABILITY INSURANCE AND PROVIDE A CERTIFICATE OR COPY TO THE FAIR OFFICE, UP TO AND INCLUDING THE DATES OF OUR FAIR. NO EXCEPTIONS. IF YOU ARE A SMALL NONFOOD BUSINESS YOU CAN PURCHASE INSURANCE FROM US FOR \$25.00 FOR THE WEEK OF THE FAIR.

29. THE WYANDOT COUNTY AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY, OFFICERS AND DIRECTORS SHALL NOT BE RESPONSIBLE FOR DAMAGES SUSTAINED BY CONCESSIONAIRES FROM UTILITY FAILURE.

30. THE WYANDOT COUNTY AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY, OFFICERS AND DIRECTORS SHALL NOT BE RESPONSIBLE FOR ANY DAMAGE DONE BY A CONCESSIONAIRE, HIS EMPLOYEES OR AGENTS TO ANY PERSON OR PROPERTY.

31. THE WYANDOT COUNTY AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY, OFFICERS AND DIRECTORS SHALL NOT BE RESPONSIBLE FOR ACCIDENTS, PROPERTY LOSS, AND DAMAGES BY FIRE, WATER, WIND OR STORM, LOSSES FROM THEFT OR ACTS OF A THIRD PARTY.

32. SECURING AND MAINTAINING ALL LOCAL, STATE, FEDERAL AND OTHER LICENSES, PERMITS, ETC. GOVERNING OR ALLOWING THE CONCESSIONAIRE TO PARTICIPATE OR SELL AND OR MANUFACUTRE HIS PRODUCT, IS THE SOLE RESPONSIBILITY OF THE CONCESSIONAIRE. THE STATE OF OHIO REQUIRES ALL TRANSIENT CONCESSIONAIRES TO HAVE A TRANSIENT VENDOR'S LICENSE IN ORDER TO SELL AT ANY OHIO EVENT. PLEASE CALL THE OHIO DEPT. OF TAXATION AT 1-800-282-1782 OR WWW.STATE.OH.US/TAX/ TO OBTAIN INFORMATION AND THE FORMS.

NO PERSON WILL BE PERMITTED TO POST OR DISPLAY SIGNS, DISTRIBUTE HANDBILLS OR ADVERTISING MATERIALS OR SELL OR DISTRIBUTE FREE ANY MERCHANDISE, EXCEPT PERSONS UNDER CONTRACT.

34. NO DUMPING OF FRYER OILS.

35. NO ANIMALS OR REPTILES INCLUDING IGUANAS SHALL BE GIVEN AWAY OR SOLD AT THE FAIR.

36. CONCESSIONAIRES CONTRACTS ARE NOT TRANSFERABLE BY THE HOLDER WITHOUT EXPRESS WRITTEN CONSENT OF SOCIETY.

37. ANY CONCESSIONAIRES CONTRACT IS SUBJECT TO CANCELLATION BY SOCIETY IF CONCESSIONAIRE IS CHARGED WITH ANY MORALLY UNACCEPTABLE BEHAVIOR.

No person shall administer to any animal within 48 hours prior to the time that the animal competes at a fair or exhibition conducted by a county or independent agricultural society authorized under Chapter 1711 of the Revised Code or by the Ohio expositions commission any drug or medicament not specifically permitted under rules of the state racing commission promulgated pursuant to Chapter 3769 of the Revised Code or under rules of the society, in respect to a county or independent agricultural society, or of the Ohio expositions commission, in respect to the Ohio State Fair. This section does not apply to any horse racing meeting conducted under a permit issued pursuant to Chapter 3769 of the Revised Code.

- (G) Whoever violates Section 959.16 of the Revised Code is guilty of a felony of the fourth degree.

INSPECTION AND HEALTH REQUIREMENTS OF LIVESTOCK EXHIBITED IN OHIO

2026 HEALTH CERTIFICATES

All horses and beef or dairy feeders exhibited at the Wyandot County Fair must be accompanied by a certificate of vaccination certified by an accredited veterinarian.

Our Fair will operate under the provisions of Ohio's **Livestock Show Reform Law** and under all applicable Chapter 901-19 of the Administrative Code (Ohio's **Livestock Tampering Exhibition Rules**) will be made available to a livestock exhibitor or an adult advisor upon request.

The following is an excerpt from the ODA Laws and Rules for County and Independent Agricultural Societies ("Redbook"). All Wyandot County Fair Exhibitors are required to abide by these laws and rules. A copy of these laws and rules in length can be obtained from the ODA website or the Secretary's Office.

901:1-18-01 Chapter's application

(A) Animals when moved within or imported into Ohio solely for exhibition purposes shall comply with the requirements of this chapter.

(B) Animals imported into Ohio for any purpose in addition to exhibition purposes shall meet all movement and import requirements of Chapter 901:1-17 of the Administrative Code.

901:1-18-02 Definitions

As used in this chapter:

"Official veterinarian" means any licensed and accredited veterinarian approved by the Ohio department of agriculture, or an employee of the Ohio department of agriculture or the United States department of agriculture, animal plant health inspection service, veterinary services.

"Certificate of veterinary inspection" means the same as an interstate certificate of veterinary inspection as defined in 9 C.F.R. 86.1.

"Contagious or infectious disease" means any disease, including any foreign animal disease, or vector, capable of transmission by any means from a carrier animal to a human or to another animal and includes dangerously contagious or infectious diseases.

"Department" means the Ohio department of agriculture or its designee.

"Exhibition" means the same as defined in section 901.70 of the Revised Code.

"Licensed and accredited veterinarian" means a person who is licensed by the state of Ohio to practice veterinary medicine and who is certified by the United States department of agriculture, animal plant health inspection service, veterinary services, to be an accredited veterinarian.

"Official ear tag" means a United States department of agriculture, animal plant health inspection services approved electronic identification device that is both visibly and electronically readable.

"Residue" means any poisonous or deleterious pesticide governed by 40 C.F.R. 180 (2017), any poisonous or deleterious substance governed by 21 C.F.R. 109.6 (2017), or any other substance governed by 21 C.F.R. 556 (2019).

901:1-18-03 Exhibitions: sanitation, inspection and records.

(A) Each entity sponsoring an exhibition shall have in attendance an official veterinarian for the duration of the exhibit.

(B) Each entity sponsoring an exhibition shall:

(1) Under the direction of the official veterinarian, thoroughly clean and disinfect each building, pen, stall, ring, or other enclosure in which animals are to be quartered for exhibition immediately prior to the exhibition;

(2) Have the official veterinarian:

(a) Examine the certificate of veterinary inspection when required for an animal brought to the exhibition;

(b) Inspect within a reasonable time of arrival each animal brought to the exhibit for any clinical signs of any infectious or contagious diseases;

(c) Inspect each animal daily that is present at the exhibition for symptoms of infectious or contagious disease.

(3) Maintain a record for one year from the date of the exhibition of each animal present at the exhibit. The records contain the name and address of the owner of each animal, the species, official identification (if applicable), and breed of the animal.

(4) Order the immediate removal of any animal which, in the opinion of the official veterinarian, places other animals at unacceptable risk of any infectious or contagious disease.

(C) The department may grant an exemption from paragraph (A) and (B)(1) of this rule upon request and for good reason.

901:1-18-04 Exhibitors. An exhibitor, owner, or bailee shall:

(A) Not present for exhibition or exhibit livestock which exhibitor, owner, or bailee knows or has reason to suspect is affected with or has been exposed to a dangerously contagious or infectious disease or residue.

(B) Immediately remove livestock with any clinical signs of an infectious or contagious disease from the exhibition premises when directed by an exhibition official, the official veterinarian, or the department.

(C) Present a certificate of veterinary inspection, registration certificate, vaccination certificate, or other document to exhibition officials, the official veterinarian, or the department upon request.

(D) Failure to comply with the rules of this chapter may result in the department taking action pursuant to section 941.10 of the Revised Code, issuing a quarantine order, or issuing a notice of violation until such time that the violation has been remedied.

901:1-18-05 Poultry and fowl.

(A) All turkeys, chickens and gamebirds exhibited in Ohio must either:

(1) Originate directly from a flock or hatchery which is a participant in the national poultry improvement plan (NPIP) for the eradication of disease and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirement of this paragraph; NPIP status is only valid for one year.

(2) Originate directly from a flock which has had a negative test for pullorum/fowl typhoid disease within twelve months preceding the opening date of exhibition and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirement of this paragraph;

(3) Have had a negative test for pullorum/fowl typhoid disease, within ninety days, preceding the opening date of the exhibition and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirement of this paragraph; or

(4) Be tested for pullorum/fowl typhoid disease upon arrival at the exhibition by a tester approved by the Ohio department of agriculture and found negative.

(B) Any co-mingling of birds voids national poultry improvement plan status from the original flock or hatchery.

(C) The rapid whole blood test shall not be used to test turkeys for compliance with the requirements of paragraphs (A)(2), (A)(3) and (A)(4) of this rule.

(D) Waterfowl, doves and pigeons are exempt from this rule.

901:1-18-06 Cattle.

- (A) Cattle moved within Ohio for exhibition must show no clinical signs or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
- (B) All cattle imported and upon entry into Ohio for exhibition must comply with rule 901:1-17-03 of the Administrative Code and be identified with an official ear tag.

901:1-18-07 Goats.

- (A) Goats moved within Ohio for exhibition:
 - (1) The animal presented for exhibition must show no clinical signs or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
 - (2) All sexually intact animals and any wether eighteen months of age and older must be identified with an official identification as defined in rule 901:1-13-04 of the Administrative Code.
- (B) Goats imported into Ohio for exhibition must comply with rule 901:1-17-06 of the Administrative Code.

901:1-18-08 Horses, mules and ponies.

- (A) Horses, mules, asses, and ponies moved within Ohio for exhibition must show no clinical signs or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease. If the animal is twelve months of age or older, the exhibition may require that the animal has been tested and classed negative to an official test for equine infectious anemia within twelve months of the opening date of the exhibition.
- (B) Horses, mules, asses, and ponies imported into Ohio for exhibition shall comply with rule 901:1-17-07 of the Administrative Code.

901:1-18-09 Sheep.

- (A) Sheep moved within Ohio for exhibition:
 - (1) The animal presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or clinical signs of an infectious or contagious disease.
 - (2) All sexually intact animals and any wether eighteen months of age and older must be identified with an official identification as defined in rule 901:1-13-04 of the Administrative Code.
- (B) Sheep imported into Ohio for exhibition must comply with rule 901:1-17-08 of the Administrative Code.

901:1-18-10 Swine.

- (A) Swine moved within Ohio for exhibition must show no clinical signs or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
- (B) Swine imported and upon entry into Ohio for exhibition shall comply with rule 901:1-17-09 of the Administrative Code and be identified with an official ear tag.

901:1-18-11 Camelids.

- (A) Camelids including, but not limited to, llamas, alpacas and vicuaas moved within Ohio for exhibition purposes must show no clinical signs or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
- (B) (B) Camelids including, but not limited to, llamas, alpacas and vicuaas imported into Ohio for exhibition must comply with paragraphs (A), (B)(3), and (C) of rule 901:1-17-15 of the Administrative Code.

SR. FAIR/OPEN CLASS EXHIBITOR RULES

Exhibitors should examine the following rules in order to understand the manner in which the fair will be conducted. (Will be enforced to the letter if possible)

Officially appointed Directors shall act as superintendents of the different departments, and are empowered to decide all questions not covered by these rules arising in their several departments.

Should any premium be found to have been obtained by false evidence, misrepresentation, or a violation of the following rules, money will be withheld by the board.

In the case of any of these general rules conflict with rules and regulations of any department under which an animal or article is exhibited, said department rules will take precedence. Should any point be covered in the general rules and not in the department rules or vice versa, the same shall be considered as appearing in both. Department rules will be found at the head of each department.

Special attention is called to people contemplating making exhibits, that the secretary will be at the secretary's office at the fairgrounds, Upper Sandusky, Ohio, during the times listed earlier in this book, so as to give those desirous of making entries before the rush of the last days previous to the opening.

ENTRIES

1. Entries are open online and in the office July 16th–Aug. 20th. Late entries will be accepted (accompanied by a late fee) until September 1st.
2. Once entries are made, including entries made in error, they will not be changed after the closing date unless it is upon recommendation from the superintendent of the department. This rule will be enforced to avoid error in the judges' entry books.
3. Entry Fees (must be paid before space will be assigned or reserved):
 - Livestock—\$5 per entry
 - Rabbits—\$4 per rabbit, \$4 for fur classes, \$5 for meat pens (3 rabbits)
 - Horses— \$5 per entry
 - \$10 per box stall
 - \$5 per tie stall
4. Each exhibitor must purchase a membership ticket or exhibitor ticket.
5. Any county that is open to Wyandot County (Exception Swine)
6. All animals and articles for premiums must be owned by the person (or some member of his or her family) entering them, properly classified and in proper position by 7 P.M. Sunday (unless specified otherwise in department rules) If not they may be excluded from competition or position as directed by the superintendent of the department.
7. Stalls and pens for horses, cattle, sheep and swine will be assigned by the superintendent in charge. **NO STALLS WILL BE ASSIGNED UNTIL ENTRIES ARE MADE, AND STALLS OR PENS ARE PAID FOR.**
8. All goods entered will receive the best care and attention, but **management will not be responsible for loss or injury to any article)**
9. An animal entered in one class cannot compete for premium in any other except sweepstakes, or in one of a pair, or herd, and must be owned by one person or farm.
10. When the entry of an article or animal is recorded in the books of the secretary, cards will be given with the number and class which are to be placed on the article or animal.

GROUNDS RULES

1. NO bedding will be furnished by the society.
2. No tan bark or mulch. Limited to straw, shavings, or sawdust on whole fairgrounds.
3. Stalls and pens must be kept in clean and sanitary condition, subject to the fair Veterinarian's approval.
4. All livestock trucks will be permitted on grounds at 11 a.m. Sunday, September 7.
5. All deliveries on the fairgrounds will be made before 10 a.m. and after 11:00 p.m.
6. No tractor or other power unit will be allowed to run unattended on the Wyandot County Fairgrounds. They may only run in the parade, pulling contest, etc. Wheels are not to be of a style that will damage the fairgrounds. Note: Due to insurance regulations – NO STEAM ENGINE MAY BE OPERATED ON THE FAIRGROUNDS.
7. NO UNAUTHORIZED GOLF CARTS WILL BE PERMITTED ON THE FAIR GROUNDS AFTER 10 A.M. DURING THE FAIR. **Authorized Golf carts: SR. FAIR BOARD, SHERIFF & AUXILIARY, EMS, FIRE DEPT., ELECTRICIION & SOUND,**
8. The Wyandot County Agricultural Society assumes no responsibility for damage to or loss of parked vehicles or personal property contained within parked vehicles.

RELEASE TIMES

JUDGING

1. **THE JUDGE'S DECISION IS FINAL.**
2. The judges will report at 9 a.m. on the day on which the classes they are to inspect, will report at the secretary's office, where he or she will be registered and receive books.
3. All awards will be made by the single judge system unless the board of directors deems it proper to do otherwise.
4. No premium will be awarded in any department unless the judge thinks the animals or articles worthy.
5. No unsound or unworthy animal or article will be allowed to compete for a premium in any class except the speed ring.
6. All protests of awards for premiums must be in writing and shall be filed with the secretary before noon on Monday after the fair.

7. No exhibitors can win more than two prizes in one class.
8. Judges' books must be returned every evening to the secretary's office.
9. All unsound animals will be disqualified and sent home at the discretion of the society.
10. No gambling, games of chance, immoral exhibitions or intoxicated people will be allowed on the grounds. No person will be allowed to sell or give away intoxicating drinks on the grounds. The above rule is in strict accordance with the state laws.
11. Whenever premiums for animals are offered, it shall be the duty of the superintendent of the various departments to check their books with exhibitors at the time of judging as no book will be changed after being returned to the secretary's office.
12. Judges shall make all awards with unbiased opinion, and such award shall be strictly upon the merit of the article displayed.
13. The members in charge of each department will give proper notice of time and place, where such class will exhibit for the awarding premiums. All livestock not present at the time and place designated SHALL FORFEIT IT'S RIGHT and the judge shall place awards same as if animal or article were not entered.
14. No judge or person is permitted to change an award after premium ribbon or card is attached to an animal or article unless fraud or misrepresentation is found.
15. In livestock, you take into consideration the symmetry, early maturing, size, age, feeding, and other circumstances connected with animals you may judge. BUT GIVE NO ENCOURAGEMENT TO OVERFEEDING.
16. On questions or disputes, you are expected to consult the member in charge, and permit no person to interfere with our deliberations, and will confer a favor by reporting all such interference to member in charge, who in turn shall report to the secretary's office.
17. Livestock judges will not decide awards until all livestock has been reviewed in each class. All livestock receiving first premium will receive a blue ribbon. All sweepstakes will receive a purple ribbon. If there is no award, write "not worthy" or "not found" as the case may be.
18. All horses and halter-broke livestock must be exhibited to the judges in the arena provided for the same, designated by the superintendents of those departments.
19. Each exhibitor must display furnished number to correspond with exhibit number. Exhibit tags must be picked up at the secretary's office.

SR. FAIR/OPEN CLASS PREMIUMS

Premium money (Sr. Fair ONLY) will be available, starting Wednesday-Saturday of the fair, 24 hours after your show at the Secretary’s Office from 8 a.m.—8 p.m or Sunday 10a.m.—2p.m.. Any premiums not picked up during these times will be forfeited. No premium will be paid unless entry tag is with animal. The Sr. Fair Board reserves the right to prorate premiums in the case of insufficient funds. All premium checks not cashed by expiration date will be voided.

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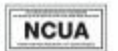

One time reweigh will be allowed at 7:00pm on Sunday night for hogs weighing 190-199lbs and 301-310lbs with a 3lbs weight allowance permitted. Animals under or over the minimum and maximum weights will not be considered for champion or reserve champion.
5. Once swine are on the fairgrounds, they will not be permitted to leave the fairgrounds.
6. Hogs will be kept in the pens they were assigned to so the number on the card matches the ear tag.
7. Nipple waterers must not exceed 6in. In diameter and be no taller than 32 in. There will be no permanent modifications allowed to be made to the gates or pens to allow the use of these waterers.
8. No feeding at the wash area. No cleaning of pans at the wash area.
9. No oil or oil based products allowed on the fairgrounds. This includes weigh ins and show day. Water soluble products are only allowable to wash swine. Show day is a WATER ONLY SHOW. (Jr. Fair and Open Class) Anyone who uses the prohibited products will be disqualified from showing.
10. No slick clipping or body shaving of market hogs except on the ears and tail.
11. Barn will be closed during judging.
12. There will be a champion and a reserve champion lightweight, medium weight, and heavy weight in each barrow and gilt division. An overall champion and reserved champion will be selected in the barrow and gilt division. An overall Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion market hog will be selected.
13. No cleaning of pens until all hogs are released from the hog barn.

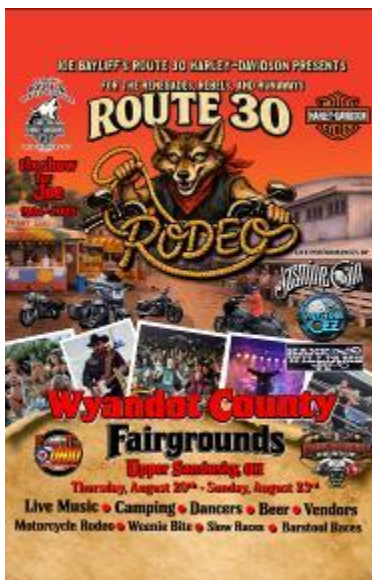

3. **All entries must be in place between 8:30 a.m. and 9:45a.m. on Tuesday Sept. 15th. Any placed after this time will be for viewing only.**
4. Exhibitors are responsible for all property.
5. All specimen must be displayed in clear glass container/ vase/ Paper wedges should be used where needed to hold specimen in place such as gladiolus and dahlias.
6. Specimen must be identified.
7. Specimen flowers must be disbudded unless stated otherwise, show with foliage and grown by exhibitor.
8. Fresh plant material must predominate unless stated otherwise in a class.
9. No wild feathers.
10. Accessories for artistic design may be used as long as they are secured to the mechanics or base and are within the design itself. No artificial or painted flowers or foliage to be used unless a class so states it can.
11. Department superintendents reserve the right to subdivide classes as needed.
12. Arrangements are to be brought in ready for placement before being placed on display table. Plant material should be identified and a 3x5 card placed interpreting the material.
13. All entries must be named as to variety. Please hand write on card.
14. The judge may refuse to make any award for an unworthy exhibit, even though it may be the only one of the class in that particular entry.
15. Ribbons will be awarded for 3 places. Rosettes for the best of show will be awarded in classes as indicated.
16. No one is permitted in the show area during the judging period except judges, clerks and authorized persons.
17. All specimens and arrangements must remain in place until noon on Sunday Sept. 20th.

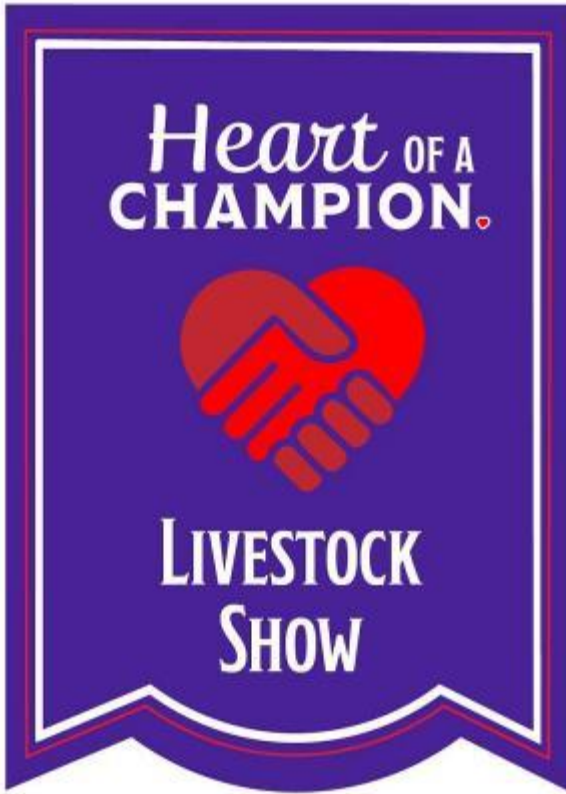

JR. FAIR EXHIBITOR RULES & REQUIREMENTS

Exhibitors should examine the following rules in order to understand the manner in which the Jr. Fair will be conducted, These rules will supersede those of any Jr. Fair organization.

The Jr. Fair is under the jurisdiction of the Jr. Fair Board with the Advisory Board and Senior Fair Board acting in a supervisory capacity. All rules and regulations pertaining to the general conduct of the Sr. Fair also apply to the Jr. Fair.

Jr. Fair Board members and advisory board members will serve as superintendents in the various departments and are empowered to decide all questions not covered by these rules. The Jr. Fair department superintendents reserve the right to interpret and administer department requirements as they see fit as a group.

The Advisory Board consists of Sr. Fair Board Members, the Agricultural Education Instructors, 4-H Representatives, the 4-H Extension Educator, FCCLA, Scout Leaders, Art and Industrial Art Teachers, and department advisors.

Jr. Fair Board members are high school students who are nominated by Jr. Fair organizations or departments of which they are currently active members or students. Appointment will be based on leadership, dependability, and achievement. Jr. Fair Board members must be active members of a Jr. Fair organization or department for the duration of their terms. The term of office shall be two years. However, a member can re-apply and be a member of the Jr. Fair Board until they have passed their 19th birthday by the first day of the year he/she would be on the board. This would allow youth to be on the board during their high school years.

Exhibitor Eligibility—

1. Exhibitors must not have passed their 19th birthday on Jan. 1 of the current year.
2. Exhibitors must be officially enrolled in and in good standing with one or more Wyandot County Jr. Fair Organization during the current year.
Jr. Fair Organizations: Wyandot County 4-H Clubs, FFA Chapters, FCCLA Chapters, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, School Art and Industrial Art Departments.
3. Any FFA student residing in Wyandot County is eligible to exhibit at the Wyandot County Fair if approved by Vo-Ag teacher.
4. Students from Carey, Mohawk, and Upper Sandusky Schools who are attending a joint vocational school are eligible to exhibit at the Wyandot County Fair if they meet all other requirements.
5. **ALL Livestock projects entered at the fair must be part of a completed 4-H or FFA project.**
6. Exhibitors involved in more than one organization must exhibit separate and different projects in each organization.
4-H, FFA, FCCLA, Scouts, School Art and Industrial Arts are considered separate organizations.
The following are examples of separate and different projects: Market Lambs and Breeding Sheep, Dairy Feeders and Beef Feeders, Horse Riding and Horse Production, Broilers and Laying Flock.
6. Anyone exhibiting a project in another county's Jr. Fair is ineligible to exhibit the same project in Wyandot County's Jr. Fair.
7. All exhibits are to be made in accordance with the exhibit guidelines for the respective projects.

Exhibitor Passes—

Jr. Fair Exhibitor Pass (purchased before Aug. 15th) - \$5

Jr. Fair Exhibitor Pass (purchased after Aug. 15th) - \$15

Youth Season Pass - \$15

1. All Exhibitors must purchase a pass from the Sr. Fair Office either through their club advisor (preferred) or by themselves no later than September 1st.
2. You will only have to purchase one pass, no matter how many organizations you are a member of.
3. Youth exhibiting in the Sr. Fair Open Classes will be required to purchase a Youth Season Pass, not both. The decision to exhibit in Jr. Fair or Jr. Fair and Open Class should be made at the time of purchasing their pass.
4. If an exhibitor fails to meet these guidelines they will not be eligible to show.
5. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to pick up their pass at the Jr. Fair Office during one of the following times:
 - Saturday, September 12th 9a.m.—5p.m.
 - Sunday, September 13th 10a.m.—7p.m.

Entries

1. Jr. Fair Entries will open online at <https://wyandot.fairwire.com> on **May 1st** and close **July 15th**.
2. There will be a one week grace period with a late fee of \$50 per entry. Contact Audrey Thiel at wyandotcountyjuniorfair@gmail.com
3. No entry fee will be charged to enter the Jr. Fair classes unless late.
4. Only one exhibit will be allowed per class, except livestock classes where two will be allowed. Exhibitors may show only two animals in any single class.
5. A given exhibit may be shown only in one class except in the case of group livestock classes. No animal may be shown in both breeding and market classes.
6. Products exhibited must be from current projects carried in one of the Jr. Fair groups. Livestock, other than market animals, may be leased for the duration of the project or owned by the exhibitor.
7. Exhibitors of the Jr. Fair may enter the open classes by conforming to those rules.
8. Release of liability forms are included online with your entry. Every effort will be made to protect exhibits from damage or loss, however the Wyandot County Senior and Junior Fair Boards will not be responsible for an entry being lost, damaged or stolen.
9. If a member of any Jr. Fair Organization has an animal that dies or cannot be brought to the fair (unruly, sick, ect.) exhibitor is required to complete a livestock entry and go through the interview judging process to receive a premium. On the livestock entry, enter "Poster Entry" in your department. All poster entries must be checked in at the respective livestock department between 2p.m. and 6p.m. on Sunday Sept. 13th. Posters will be on display in each species barn.

Livestock Rules & Requirements

1. All health regulations pertaining to the Sr. Fair livestock shall also apply to Jr. Fair livestock exhibits. (pg. 31)
2. Our fair will operate under the provisions of Ohio's Livestock Show Reform Act and under all applicable Ohio Department of Agriculture Administrative Code Rules. These rules will be made available to livestock exhibitors or adult advisors upon request. Below is only an excerpt of these rules:

Ohio's Livestock Show Reform Act and Ohio Department of Agriculture Exhibition Rules:**901-19-31 Responsibilities of and Assistance to Jr. Fair Exhibitors.**

A Jr. Fair livestock exhibitor shall be responsible for the continuous care, grooming and preparation of the livestock entered in the Jr. Fair Livestock Show.

An exhibitor may receive assistance in the care, grooming and preparation of the livestock entered in the Jr. Fair Livestock Show, provided that the **assistance shall be limited to explanation or demonstration** provided by the following:

Family members

Household members

FFA Advisors or adult volunteers of 4-H or FFA in the exhibitor's club or county

Agricultural Educators

County Extension Educator

Department representatives

Veterinarians

Members of the exhibitor's 4-H club, FFA chapter or other youth organization.

Guest speakers of 4-H, FFA or other youth organizations

***MUST REGISTER AT THE JR. FAIR OFFICE**

Any person not specified above in this rule who provides assistance to a Jr. livestock show exhibitor shall register in writing with the sponsor. The responsibility to register rest with the exhibitor. An assistant may register for more than one exhibitor. Failure to register constitutes grounds for disciplinary action against the exhibitor.

Assistance shall be limited to explanation and minimal demonstration.

901-19-32 Breed Shows or Classes –

Unless otherwise modified by this chapter, the rules of the breed association shall be accepted grooming practices for that particular breed's show or class

901-19-33 Prohibited Grooming Practices –

The following grooming practices are prohibited in junior market livestock shows unless those grooming practices are permitted under rule 901-19 32 of the Administrative Code:

- A. Using any substance to enhance or change the color of the livestock, including the livestock's hide or hooves.
- B. Adding any substance externally to build up, change or alter the shape or conformation of the livestock, including by way of example but not limited to rope, false hair, graphite, hemp and powders.
- C. Pigmented grooming aids or materials.
- D. Slick clipping or body shaving of market hogs is prohibited except on the ears and tail.

3. **Livestock interview judging** is at the discretion of each Jr. Fair organization.
 - 4-H Livestock book judging will be held at the fairgrounds arena on Saturday August 15, 2026 from 1p.m. to 5p.m.
 - Make-up 4-H Livestock book judging will be held by appointment only through the Extension Office.

- 4. Ohio Department of Agriculture requires that all exhibitors must attend a **Quality Assurance** session at one of the below times unless they have “tested out”.
 - Deadline for Quality Assurance is July 15th.
 - Wyandot County Jr. Fair Market projects that require Quality Assurance training are: market beef, market dairy beef, market swine, market lamb, market goats, market poultry and eggs, market rabbits (not pet rabbit or breeding rabbit), beef feeders, dairy feeders, crossbred feeders, lactating dairy cows, and lactating goats.
 - A parent, guardian, or responsible adult must attend the training with any first year exhibitor.
 - There will be no make-up opportunity for Quality Assurance training. Exhibitors not receiving the training by July 15, 2026 will not be eligible to exhibit at the 2026 Wyandot County Fair.
 - Quality Assurance training from another exhibition will be accepted for the Wyandot County Fair. The Exhibitor must present proof of training to the OSU Extension Office before July 15, 2026.
 - Youth (who are 15 years of age and older and not a first time exhibitor) may take a test based on the appropriate skill level for their age following the Quality Assurance program. Youth who pass the test will be exempt from the Quality Assurance recertification until they are no longer a junior fair exhibitor.

5. **Possession Dates**

Publication and enforcement of the minimum length of ownership and custody required for the respective market class animals in order to qualify for exhibiting, competing and participating in the respective Jr. Fair livestock auctions.

6. Tagging

Mandatory Tagging Dates (there will be no make-up opportunities):

Feeder Calves: First Saturday in June—Weigh in is optional, animals must be tied and in a clean/ well bedded trailer, mandatory vaccines will be administered at this time for \$10 (cash or check only)

Sheep and Goats: First Saturday in June— weigh in is optional, Scrapies tags are mandatory, animals must be tied and in a clean/ well bedded trailer

Swine Production: June 21st— mandatory weigh in and tagging
Rabbits:

Market Beef: Date TBD 8a.m.—11a.m.—weigh in optional

*Junior Fair Department Advisors reserve the right to refuse tagging of animals that are unruly to the point it is deemed unsafe. Exhibitor/ owner may tag the animal(s) themselves onsite

7. Exhibitors must abide by stall assignments made by department advisors.
8. **Check in**—All exhibitors except rabbits can bring their animals starting at 8a.m. Sunday September 13th. Rabbits can only be brought in from 2p.m. -6p.m.
 - Exhibitors are responsible for checking in (both Market and breeding) and weighing in the animal, in their respective department from 2p.m. -6p.m.
 - All market animals will be weighed at this time.
 - Any animal coming in after 6p.m., unless the Jr. Fair coordinator is notified, will be graded in the stall or pen, receive A, B or C grade and will not qualify for a county award or be able to sell in the sale ring.
 - There will be an allowance for 2 reweighs in the following departments: Swine, Sheep, Rabbits, Feeders and Steers. See department rules for more info.
9. Each exhibitor is responsible for the care and feeding of their animal at all times.
10. There will be veterinarian livestock inspections during the fair beginning at check in. Any animals showing signs of contagious diseases or poor health will be removed from the grounds. To avoid having to take your projects home, have your animals inspected for common diseases. (Poultry and rabbits—mites, cankers, ect. Others—ringworm ect.) Poultry and rabbits will be examined when they arrive or soon after.
11. **Premiums will be withheld from exhibitors if they fail to maintain general healthy conditions for their animals—to be monitored by the department staff and the Wyandot County Fair Vet.**
12. If the Vet asses any ringworm on an animal, it will not be permitted to remain on the fairgrounds. Warts are at the vet's discretion.
13. All animals must be in their assigned pens, without body coverings such as blankets and hoods, for veterinary inspections.
14. A Certificate of Vaccination is required for horses and feeder calves only. This can be filled out by your veterinarian at the time of vaccination and does not require a visual inspection of the animal within 30 days of the Fair.
15. If you have any concerns about whether or not your animal is healthy for the fair, you should have the animal examined by a veterinarian prior to the arrival at the fair.
16. Drug Use Notification Forms (DUNF) must be completed for all junior market livestock (including poultry, feeder calves, lactating dairy cattle and lactating goats) These forms must be completed online the night of check in and accurate in order to show. The DUNF form must be reviewed for compliance with mandatory annual attendance or completion of a Quality Assurance program.

17. Exhibitors are responsible for drug residue in market animals. Tranquilizers are considered illegal drugs and are not acceptable. Some feeds have medications that require withdrawal time.
18. Health papers are not required for in-state animals. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection is required for animals from out of state.
19. Drench guns are NOT APPROVED for use while on the fairgrounds. Anyone found to be using a drench gun to administer liquids or paste into any animal without the supervision and direction of the official fair veterinarian and/or designated department official will result in exhibit and/or exhibitor being disqualified.

Grounds Rules—

1. No tan bark or mulch; limited to straw, shavings or sawdust on entire fairgrounds.
2. Stall space is not to be used for any hay, straw, feed or supplies.
3. All Jr. Fair exhibits will be displayed or housed where designated by the superintendents in charge.
4. No one will be permitted to stay in Jr. Fair buildings or tents overnight unless special reason can be shown.
5. All livestock and poultry exhibits must have pen or stall cleaned out by 5pm on day of release, OR EARLIER as specified in your department, or the exhibitor will be penalized \$100/ pen that must be paid before entries are accepted next year.
6. Feed and equipment storage will be furnished by the exhibitor.
7. All large animals (cattle and horses) need to be double tied.
8. Pens, aisles, feed and equipment are to be kept neat, clean and orderly.
9. No generators will be allowed around the wash rack areas.
10. No radios or music allowed in grooming or wash rack areas.
11. Exhibitors must use provided pens assigned by the Jr. Fair department.
12. **Clean Pen Award:**

The Jr. Fair department of each barn will pick two people per day that they believe has kept their pen, AND the aisleway in front of it the cleanest. The two winners of each barn will be given a free milkshake coupon to be used at the Jr. Fair Lunchstand. An exhibitor may only win the Clean Pen Award one time during the week of the fair, but is expected to keep up the good work the remainder of fair week. Premium money may be revoked if an exhibitor has to be asked repeatedly to clean their pen and/or the aisleway in front of it.

12. Grooming/Chute Space Guidelines

- No chutes, stands, tents or supplies are permitted on the fairgrounds before Saturday before check-in at 8:00a.m. This includes markings on the ground or stakes and/or ropes of any kind.
- Only chutes and grooming supplies should be in grooming areas. Please use reasonable judgement – department personnel may ask you to remove items not used in caring for or grooming livestock.
- Exhibitors should plan to bring their own power – our buildings and electric are not equipped to handle the demand.
- In an effort to have room for everyone, we ask that exhibitors limit their space to only what is necessary – partner up with friends/family/club members when possible.
- Consequences of violating these guidelines will be based on severity and frequency of violations to include: verbal warning, written warning, loss of privileges to bring tents and/or grooming chutes to the Wyandot County Fair.

- Labeling chutes, stands, or tents with a name and phone number would be appreciated to help us quickly contact you if needed.

Judging—

1. The decision of a judge is final.
2. Only exhibits receiving an “A” grade on projects which are graded will be eligible to compete for special awards.
3. Only Livestock projects receiving an “A” grade in the show ring will be eligible for grand or reserve champion awards.
4. When an exhibit is deemed not worthy of a special award, the judge will make no award even though there may be no competition.
5. At their discretion, judges may award special awards.
6. Exhibitors must show their own project. Any exhibitor showing an animal at the Wyandot County Junior Fair must show his or her animal and stay with that animal through the completion of that class. The only exceptions will be a physical impairment accompanied by a written excuse from a doctor at least one hour prior to show time, or if an exhibitor has two animals showing at the exact same time/ in the same class. In the case of these exceptions, only another current Wyandot County Junior Fair exhibitor can show the animal.
7. Junior/ Senior Fair Department Advisors reserve the right to remove an animal from the show ring if it poses a danger to exhibitors and other animals.
8. **Jr. Fair Dress Code**—these requirements apply to show and sale. Exhibitors will not be permitted to enter the show/sale ring without appropriate attire. Judges will be informed of this dress code.

Dairy—White, full button up shirt (no polo) to be buttoned from bottom to at least two buttons from the collar and tucked in. White pants/jeans with no holes.

Horses—Follow the attire described in the Uniform Rules for 4-H Horse Shows available from the Extension Office.

All other species—Full button up shirt (no polos) to be buttoned from bottom to at least two buttons from the collar and tucked in. Jeans/pants with no holes.

8. Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion Hogs, Beef, Goats and Sheep will be tagged immediately following champion selection. These animals will be slaughtered at a Senior Fair Board designated slaughterhouse. Those animals must be slaughtered with procedures to be followed as specifically directed by the Senior Fair Board. The carcasses will be inspected by either ODA or USDA.
9. Any exhibitor pulling their animal from competition once they have entered the show arena or if an exhibitor who stood first in their class does not return for the champion class, the exhibitor will be disqualified from the show and will forfeit all premiums and awards won at the 2026 Wyandot County Fair.

Release Times—

1. The Wyandot County Fair reserves the right to dismiss an animal based on nutritional and well being per the recommendation of the majority vote of the Wyandot County Fair Vet, Advisory Board, Jr. Fair Coordinator, Sr. Fair Board, and the President of the Jr. Fair Board or the Executive/Representative.
2. Exhibitors are responsible for his/her livestock project until the appropriate release time on Sunday Sept. 20th.
3. All animals will remain on the fairgrounds until their release time.
4. Buyers have two hours after release time of that species to pick up animals or make arrangements with the head of the department.

 Draft Horses—8a.m.
 Rabbits, & Poultry— 9a.m.
 Horses, Cattle, Goats, Swine, Sheep & Still Projects— 10a.m.
 Feeder Calf Back to Farm Sale—1:00p.m. (all items should be removed from beef barn before 1:00p.m.)

Premiums—

1. An entry, exhibitor pass and exhibit are required to receive premium.
2. 4-H Cloverbud and Boy/girl Scout premiums will be paid to the Club/troop. Individual premiums will not be issued.
3. Premiums may be picked up starting Friday of fair week at the times and locations listed below.
4. **Any premium money that is not picked up by 11a.m. on Sunday is forfeited.** No money will be mailed.
5. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to make sure that their premium money gets picked up, but they may ask someone else to pick it up for them if these times do not work for them.
6. Advisors: club advisors that would like to pick up premium money for their members must turn in a list, containing only members that do not plan to pick their money up themselves, to Audrey Thiel no later than Thursday of the fair at 7p.m. Advisors can pick up a packet of the premium money requested during one of the pickup times listed below.

Cloverbuds—\$1 per participating Cloverbud (with pass and entry) will be paid to the club.

4-H Booths—Each participating club that follows all guidelines will receive \$20 premium. The 3 clubs that receive one of the special awards will receive an additional \$5.

Flower Beds— Participating organizations that follow guidelines with 80 points or more out of 160 points will receive \$25, and organizations with 79 points or less will receive \$10. The highest scoring organization will receive \$50 and the second highest scoring organization will receive \$35.

Grand Parade Floats—Each participating organization that follows all guidelines will receive \$20.

Scouts Projects—\$1 per participating exhibitor will be paid to the troops. No individual premium money will be issued to Boy or Girl Scouts.

Scout Booths—Each participating troop that follows all guidelines will receive \$20 premium. The 3 clubs that receive one of the special awards will receive an additional \$5.

Protests of Awards Procedure

- Protests regarding Jr. Fair livestock competitions shall be submitted in writing by the party making the protest to the Junior Fair Coordinator no later than Noon on the day following the competition in question.
- Any party making a protest shall submit a fee of \$100 to the Jr Fair Board along with their written statement. The fee shall be refunded only if the protest is sustained by the decision committee.
- The decision committee shall include the Junior Fair Coordinator, Officers of the Senior Fair Board, and Junior Fair Advisory Board and Senior Fair Board members from the department involved as well as at least one Junior Fair Board Officer and Junior Fair Board department member.
- The decision committee will hold a meeting regarding the protest at which time the party who filed the protest may present evidence of arguments in support of their protest.

The written decision of the decision committee shall be finalized, signed by the Jr Fair Coordinator and Sr Fair Board President, and served by e-mail or mail to the party making the protest within 10 days of the date of hearing



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JR. FAIR SHOWMANSHIP CLASSES

1. Each livestock exhibitor is encouraged to enter the showmanship classes. There is no entry form but be sure to check the bulletin board in the departments to see if a sign-up is required.
2. Exhibitors must use their project animals which they have shown or will show in other classes in the Jr. Fair.
3. An exhibitor's age on Jan. 1st of the current year determines the showmanship division the exhibitor participates in.
4. There is no limit on the number of showmanship classes an exhibitor can enter or win in one year.
5. Unless noted for the department, exhibitors may show multiple years in senior showmanship, even having won that senior showmanship division in previous years.
6. Exhibitors winning their age division (with the exception of the senior division) have the option of moving up an age division or remaining in that age division the following year(s) until they age out of the division.
7. Fitting Includes:
 Soundness—condition and quality in the case of beef animals, sheep and swine, firmness, and uniformity.
 Cleanliness—hide, hair, hoofs.
 General appearance of animals.
 Showing includes:
 Appearance of the exhibitor and equipment used to show animals.
 Ability to properly pose animals.
 Exhibitor must demonstrate ability to show his animal around ring as directed by the judge.

1. The Showman of Showmen show is a competition between the representatives of the senior showmanship classes. All senior showmanship division winners in beef feeders, dairy, dairy/crossbred dairy beef feeders, dairy/crossbred dairy beef steers, goats, horses, market beef or beef breeding, poultry, rabbits, sheep, and swine departments are eligible to compete. In order to add a livestock species to this list there must be a minimum of 10 exhibitors showing that species in one year. Additions and changes will be made the following year to the livestock list as long as 10 exhibitors are expected that year. The departments will determine how their senior age participant is selected.
2. Dress for the contest should reflect proper and appropriate show ring apparel for the specific species represented. The Junior Fair Dress Code requirements can be found in the Jr. Fair Exhibitor Rules and Requirements section of this book. Livestock do not need to be groomed, only presented clean and with appropriate show equipment.
3. Should one contestant have won two Senior Showmanship Divisions, they must decide which specie they choose to represent with the runner-up in the other division taking their place. ***Contestants must decide within 24 hours of a show if they will represent that species or not to give the runner-up time to prepare.*
4. Should someone be unable to participate, the runner-up will show. It is the responsibility of the winner to notify the runner-up of their opportunity and let the ag teachers know who is showing *** If the runner up cannot compete, then the third place contestant will be provided the opportunity. If the third-place contestant cannot compete, then the species will not be represented in Showman of Showmen for the current year.*
5. Each participant will sign a release of liability form in order to participate.
6. The contest participant will provide their animal and show equipment for the competition in the fair arena at 4:45 p.m. on Saturday of the show. If you feel your animal would not do well in Showman of Showmen and be able to be handled by all contestants, please find a suitable replacement. The poultry division must be represented by a market broiler, no matter what was shown by the winning poultry exhibitor. Animals may be switched out between rotations if needed due to animal fatigue.
7. Due to the similarity of the size and style of showmanship between the market/ breeding beef and dairy/crossbred dairy beef steers and between the beef feeders and dairy/crossbred dairy beef feeders, these exhibitors will only present one of the species for the competition on a rotating basis every two years (even years =

market/breeding beef and dairy/crossbred dairy beef feeder, odd years = dairy/crossbred dairy beef steer and beef feeder).

8. Contestants will be asked to rotate to different species every five minutes. In addition, one rotation will be a 10 question general knowledge test on the species exhibited and the livestock industry. A second rotation will be public speaking where participants will introduce themselves, tell where they are from, what organization they represent, which species they represent, which species they show, what they like about the fair, what they are most looking forward to showing and most scared of showing, and then any additional comments they would like to make.
9. Each judge will rate the participants on a scale of one to ten, with ten being the best. The highest cumulative score will win the contest. Each contestant's score on their represented species will not be used in the scoring, though they will begin by showing their represented species. The two species "out" for the year will begin with the general knowledge test and public speaking.
10. In order to account for an uneven number of scores for those representing the cattle departments, the beef feeder and dairy/crossbred dairy beef feeder participants will not receive a score in either area and the market/breeding beef and dairy crossbred dairy beef steer participants will not receive a score in either area as well. This equalizes the number of scores.
11. Calculating the deviation in the contestant's scores will break a tie. The highest score will be subtracted from the lowest score, yielding the deviation in the contestant's scores. If a tie still exists, then the tie breaker will be the contestant's score on the general knowledge test.
12. A suitable representative of representatives chosen by the Wyandot County Agricultural Education Instructors will judge each division.
13. An exhibitor may only win the Showman of Showmen contest one time during their Jr. Fair career. Contestants may participate more than one time depending on senior showmanship eligibility as set by the departments.

Nominees may apply or be nominated by a Jr. Fair Organization no later than **July 1st**. Nominees will be sent an application form on or before July 1st which must be submitted to the Jr. Fair by **July 15th**.

Requirements for candidates:

1. Must be 16-19 years of age as of January 1st of the current year.
2. Three years of completed 4-H work or two years in any other Jr. Fair organization or school department and must presently be an active member of the group being represented.
3. Applicant must sign Jr. Fair contract to participate in the King and Queen Contest.
4. Anyone who has been on the court in previous years has the option to reapply, but for not more than two years.
5. Members will be selected on the basis of their participation in Jr. Fair in previous years, on leadership skills, activities in 4-H, FFA, FCCLA, Scouts, Church, School and their poise in presenting themselves before a group.
6. Each applicant is to submit a current picture with a completed application form. Two letters of recommendations must be included with the application. (Recommendations may **not** be written by relatives and/or family members.)
7. The candidates will be interviewed by judges (not from Wyandot County) at a dinner hosted by the Jr. Fair Board in August. Each nominee will participate in a one-on-one interview with the judges. During this same evening, nominees will interact with the judges and current Jr. Fair Board members in various activities. This allows the judges an overall view of the nominees. Judges will make their final choice that evening of the five king candidates and five queen candidates who will participate in the pageant. The ten candidates selected by the judges will be introduced at the King and Queen Pageant. Each candidate will introduce himself and herself and tell the audience about their activities. A question will be asked of each candidate to help the judges with their final decisions. After the questions, the judges will announce the first King and Queen runner-up and their final decision for the crowning of the 2026 Jr. Fair King and Queen.

SPECIES ROYALTY

APPLICATIONS DUE JULY 15th – shall be submitted online or turned into the Wyandot County Senior Fair Office. Applications available online or from the office by May 15. Contact Jr. Fair Coordinator with questions.

One male and one female representative may be chosen for each species, provided judges deem them quality candidates: Beef/Beef Feeders, Dairy, Dairy Feeders (& Crossbreds), Goats, Poultry, Rabbits, Sheep, Swine, Horses.

General qualifications for all species:

1. Must be at least 13 years of age as of January 1st
2. Must have exhibited the species one year prior AND be currently enrolled in species project in 4-H or FFA and in good standing.
3. May apply for up to 2 species, but may only represent one each year and may only represent each species once
4. Horse department may choose a Queen and King (ages 14 or over on Jan 1st) as well as a Prince/Princess (ages 13 or under as of Jan 1st) Must be present for crowning at Monday's Jr Fair Horse Show
5. Must attend in person interviews scheduled in August.

All representatives will be expected to:

1. Attend their department show(s) to introduce themselves and help hand out ribbons and awards
2. Attend the Junior Fair Royalty Pageant on Monday night of Fair to introduce yourself and meet royalty from other counties
3. Wear your sash and tiara/hat throughout the fair
4. Take initiative when in your barn to talk with fairgoers about your project and answer questions
5. Help and encourage younger exhibitors
6. Sign up for a shift in the lunch stand
7. Help with Arena/barn clean up to keep things looking nice for your shows

In addition to the Wyandot County Fair, representatives are encouraged to wear their sash and tiara/hat at other county events and while visiting other county fairs around Ohio – some fairs may offer free admission for royalty - it is best to check with their office beforehand. Local parade opportunities are also available.

1. The purpose of this sale is to provide a marketing opportunity for small and large animals and animal products. All animals must have been exhibited in the Jr. Fair show in order to be eligible to sell.
2. Donations will be accepted following the sale of the gallon of milk. Anyone donating will be listed and thanked in a newspaper ad.
3. Special charitable donations will not be announced during the sale and cannot be solicited on the fairgrounds during the week of the fair.
4. Buyers will assume risks for the animals following the release times.
5. **Buyer's Note:** All sales must be paid for the day of the sale for those purchasing animals or within 30 days (or arrangements must be made with the clerk before leaving the arena.) An additional 2% interest per month will be charged after this time. Shipping instructions must be put on the bill at the time of settlement. Exhibitors' checks will be held until all buyers' payments have been received.

Exhibitor Rules:

1. Sale/Destination Forms must be turned in for **all** market animals and those planning to participate in the gallon of milk sale, 1/2 hour after check-in.
2. **The decision to sell an animal cannot be reversed/changed unless an exhibitor's animal wins a Grand Champion or Reserve Grand Champion title later in the week.** It is the responsibility of a parent or guardian to contact the sale office on any Grand and Reserve Grand Champion winners no later the 11:59 pm Thursday night of the fair week.
3. Exhibitors may sell **ONE TIME ONLY** in the Jr. Fair Sale, including the gallon of milk.
4. If an exhibitor has more than one Grand or Reserve Grand Champion, they are required to sell **each** Grand or Reserve Grand Champion. The Grand and Reserve Grand Champions of each species **are required** to sell in the Jr. Fair Livestock Sale. The only exception: Beef Feeders and Dairy/ Crossbred Feeders.
5. The exhibitor will only be allowed to change an earlier sale choice 30 minutes following the last species show, **if and only if** a subsequent project wins a **Grand**

- Champion or Reserve Grand Champion title.** In that situation, the first project signed to sell may sell base bid or be taken home.
6. Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion hogs, beef, sheep and goats will be tagged immediately following champion selection. These animals will be slaughtered at a Sr. Fair Board designated slaughterhouse. Those animals must be slaughtered with procedures to be followed as specifically directed by the Sr. Fair Board. The carcasses will be inspected by either ODA or USDA.
 7. Jr. Fair exhibitors are responsible to see that their animals are in the sale ring at the time they are to be sold. They are also responsible for returning their animal (s) to the barn in proper stall/pen.
 8. Each exhibitor is responsible for his/her animal until species release time.
 9. In case an animal fails to receive a bid it remains the property of the exhibitor.
 10. **NO POULTRY IN SALE RING - NO EXCEPTIONS!**
 11. If an exhibitor wishes to donate all or some of their sale proceeds from the Junior Fair Livestock sale to a charitable organization they must obtain a Charitable Contribution Intent Form (CCIF) from the Senior Fair Office. The completed CCIF must be submitted to the Senior Fair Secretary by 5:00 pm, 10 days prior to the sale.
 12. Deductions to cover sale expenses will be:
 - All Livestock - 1%
 - All Division Champions and Reserve Division Champions - 2%
 - All Grand and Reserve Grand Champions - 3%
 - An exhibitor who wins multiple Grand and Reserve Grand Champions—A cumulative 2% commission will be assessed for each species sold according to the sale order.
 13. Jr. Fair dress code for shows applies to the sale.
 14. No decorating of yourself or your animal, other than special awards won by the animal shown or exhibited during the current fair.
 15. Jr. Fair Department Royalty for this year's fair may wear their sash and/or crown, but only in the department they represent. The Jr. Fair King and Queen, crowned and reigning for this year's fair, may wear their sash and or crown to sell any species at this year's fair only. This is at the discretion of the Sale Committee. Sale Committee has final authority.

Department Specific Rules:

1. A Market Beef Steer or Heifer has only beef breeding.
2. A Market Dairy Steer has ONLY dairy breeding. The following are recognized dairy breeds: Holstein, Jersey, Guernsey, Brown Swiss, Ayrshire, and Milking Shorthorn. All recognized purebred dairy crosses WITHIN the previously mentioned recognized dairy breeds only will be allowed.
3. A Market Crossbred Steer is a cross between any dairy and any beef breeds.
4. A team of 3rd party evaluators will be present at Sunday night check in to determine breed eligibility of ALL market steers. The decision that is made by the evaluators is final. Any market steers determined to be entered in the wrong class at check in will be moved to the appropriate class provided the exhibitor does not exceed the limit for that class. If an exhibitor exceeds the entry limit (2) for a class, excess animals will not be permitted to be exhibited.
5. All market heifers cannot show in breeding classes.
6. Market heifers must not be bred.
7. All Market Beef must be ear tagged by the Jr. Fair department after the possession date of Dec. 15th.
8. All Market Beef will have **2 ear tags and a hair sample pulled**. If an ear tag falls out, you must notify the Jr. Fair coordinator immediately. (Kayla Weaver, 567-232-1921, weaver.kayla@gmail.com) If both tags are missing from the ears, a hair sample will be pulled from the animal and tested against the sample pulled at tag in to remain eligible, If samples do not match, the animal will be ineligible to show. EXHIBITOR WILL BE RESPONSIBLE FOR THE COST OF THE TESTS. If tags are missing within 4 weeks of the fair and test results that do not match come back after the show, exhibitor must return any awards and any exhibitor checks will be withheld. (Checks would go to Junior Fair's general fund)
9. Family Tagging—Each exhibitor may only exhibit 2 market beef animals per class but may tag up to 3 market beef animals per class. With family tagging any child within that family may choose from the total number that were tagged per class.
10. All Market Beef animals will show by weight class only.
11. Market Beef minimum weight is 1000lbs. Animals under this weight will not be considered for awards. Market Beef weighing within 10lbs of 1000lbs are allowed up to two re-weighs prior to 6p.m. during check in.

- 12. All Market Beef must be properly dehorned and regrowth of 1 inch or less.
- 13. No Market Beef animal can have evidence of testicular tissue.
- 14. No paint will be allowed on animals.
- 15. 2-Year Market Beef Steers and 2-Year Market Dairy Steers will show in their respective market class and then in the 2-Year Market Class(es) as an additional class after the market classes.

Department Specific Rules:

1. Beef feeder calves must be born between March 1st and April 30th of the current year.
2. Beef feeders can be a male or female animal.
3. A beef feeder has beef breeding.
4. Heifers showing in the beef feeder class may not show in breeding classes.
5. All feeder calves must be ear tagged by the Jr. Fair department on the first Saturday in June.
6. Each exhibitor may only exhibit 2 market feeders per class but may tag up to 3 feeders per class. With family tagging any child within that family may choose from the total number that were tagged per class.
7. All feeder calves must be properly dehorned with regrowth of 1 inch or less.
8. All male feeder calves must be properly castrated surgically or by banding before July 15th. It must be noted by the veterinarian on the health certificate. If there is any evidence of testicular tissue at Sunday night check in, the animal will be disqualified and the exhibitor will not receive premium.

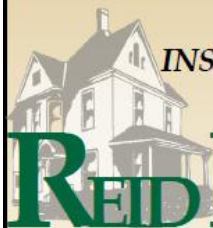

1. Dairy and crossbred dairy beef feeders must be male animals born between March 15th and May 15th of the current year.
2. Dairy feeder calves are calves with only dairy breeding. The following are recognized dairy breeds: Holstein, Jersey, Guernsey, Brown Swiss, Ayrshire, Milking Shorthorn. Only recognized purebred dairy or crosses of recognized dairy breeds will be allowed in the dairy feeder show.
3. A Team of 3rd party evaluators will be present at Sunday night check in to determine breed eligibility of feeder calves. The decision that is made by the evaluators is final. Any feeder calves determined to be entered in the wrong class at check-in will be moved to the appropriate class provided the exhibitor does not exceed the limit (2) for that class. If the classification of animals at check in results in too many in a class, exhibitors may choose to show up a class (dairy feeders bump to crossbred, crossbred bump to beef) rather than going home.
4. All feeder calves must be ear tagged by the Jr. Fair on the first Saturday in June.
5. Each exhibitor may only exhibit 2 feeders per class but may tag up to 3 feeders per class. With family tagging any child within that family may choose from the total number that were tagged per class.
6. All feeder calves must be properly dehorned with regrowth of 1 inch or less.
7. All male feeder calves must be properly castrated surgically or by banding before July 15th. It must be noted by the veterinarian on the health certificate. If there is any evidence of testicular tissue at Sunday night check in, the animal will be disqualified and the exhibitor will not receive premium.
8. All feeder calves must be accompanied by a certificate of vaccination issued by a veterinarian. They are also required to have 2 vaccinations. One shot will be on the first Saturday in June (\$10 per calf) and again between July 10th and August 15th when the certificate is issued.
9. Maximum weight for feeder calves is 650 lbs. All feeder calves will be weighed during Sunday night check-in. Up to 2 reweighs will be allowed prior to 6:00 p.m. on Sunday night for calves within 10 lbs. of the maximum weight of 650 lbs.
10. Overweight calves will not be eligible for champion or reserve champion, but will be eligible for rate of gain awards.
11. No gates or fan cages are to be set up in the dairy feeder barns before 6p.m. on the Sunday evening of check in.

1. Goats must be in exhibitor's possession by June 1st.
2. Dairy and boer market kids may be does or wethers.
3. All goats must be either tattooed, tagged or micro-chipped with an official USDA Scrapie identification prior to being unloaded Sunday night at check in.
4. All market goats must be tagged on the first Saturday in June.
5. Each exhibitor may only exhibit 2 goats per class but may tag up to 4 goats per class. With family tagging any child within that family may choose from the total number of goats that were tagged per class.
6. Each exhibitor may bring a maximum of 8 goats to the fair. This may include any combination of market and breeding animals, not to exceed 2 per class. Up to 10 entries can be made online prior to July 15th but only 8 will be allowed to exhibit at the fair.
7. All male market goats must be properly castrated. No intact males will be allowed on the fairgrounds. Recommended procedures are surgically, banded or clamped. There can be no evidence of testicular tissue at Sunday night check in.
8. All horns must be either tipped or have a protective structure covering the tip during the show. During the rest of the fair, they shall be properly secured and be no danger to any observers.
9. Market class animals and dairy goats must be shaved. Boer breeding does must be clipped.
10. The minimum weight for all market goats is 45lbs, with up to 2 re-weighs before 6p.m. allowed for goats within 3lbs. All underweight goats will have their own class, but will not be considered for champion or reserve champion, but will be eligible to participate in the livestock sale.
11. All dairy goats will be milked out at 9:00 p.m. before the day of the show.
12. The Grand Champion breeding does (includes Dairy, Angora, Pygmy and Boer) cannot be shown at the fair the following year by any exhibitor.

1. The number of horses is limited to no more than 2 horses or a combination of horse and pony per exhibitor. Weanling beside a mare does not count toward combination total.
2. There is no limit on the number of classes an exhibitor can enter, except for 1st year exhibitors participating in the Shared Horse Program.
3. Horses are over 58", Ponies are 58" and under, Mini Ponies are 38" and under. Official Show heights will be determined in June.
4. All Jr. Fair members are required to wear a helmet when riding on the fairgrounds.
5. All Jr. Fair horses and ponies must be stalled on the fairgrounds for the duration of the fair. No stallions beyond foaling year may be stalled in the Jr. Fair horse barn or entered in any Jr. Fair classes.
6. Horses may be brought to the fairgrounds from 8:00a.m. on Sunday of check in until 7:00p.m.
7. Sawdust bedding for all Jr. Fair horses and ponies will be provided by the Wyandot County Horse Committee. There will be a mandatory \$10 charge per horse which will be collected by 4-H/FFA advisors at the time Jr. Fair entries are completed. Payment must be received to show. No bedding brought by Jr. Fair exhibitors will be permitted.
8. No horses or ponies are permitted outside the immediate area of the Jr. Fair horse barn during the fair. Horses should be in the barn, wash rack, or arena at all times.
9. The Jr. Fair horse arena will be closed from 12a.m. to 6a.m.
10. In addition to state health regulations, the following health regulations will be enforced by the local fair board upon recommendation of the Wyandot County veterinarian: Require Equine Influenza Vaccination to be given between March 1, 2026 and August 31, 2026. The vaccination for Rhinopneumonitis & Rabies is at the discretion of the horse's owner. Shots must be given by a veterinarian and certificate of vaccination turned into the horse department advisory board prior to entry to the fair.
11. The Wyandot County horse department abides by the "Uniform Rules for 4-H Horse Shows."
12. Members showing in the pleasure classes MUST choose 1 type of pleasure class. Must choose either Ranch or Western, you may not cross enter.

Department Specific Rules:

1. Exhibitors are limited to one entry per class.
2. Poultry exhibitors must bring shavings daily due to lack of storage space in the poultry barn. No fans or extension cords will be allowed in the poultry barn.
3. No adults will be allowed to flip turkeys during the poultry show.
4. The dates with class numbers are a window of time all Jr. Fair exhibitors are to have poultry hatched and in their possession in order to be considered for competition.
5. All poultry projects must be in the exhibitor's possession by August 1 of the current year, except for eggs.
6. All poultry under 1 year of age must be hatched from a NPIP hatchery or from a state certified Pullorum-Typhoid Tested Flock or be tested with a certified Pullorum test prior to September 1. A copy of hatch papers may be turned in electronically starting August 1st or physical copies must be turned in prior to check in on Sunday.
7. All poultry over one year old must be tested with a certified Pullorum test prior to September 1. Pullorum tests are at the owner's expense. A copy of negative Pullorum testing results may be turned in electronically starting August 1st or physical copies must be turned in prior to check in on Sunday.
8. Animals are not to be replaced after possession dates.

MARKET CLASSES -

These classes are for commercial meat production, not breed production, so select and rear your birds accordingly.

093 - Market Chicken - July 27-July 31 (pen of 3 males)

094 - Market Ducks - June 22-July 31 (pen of 2 males)

095 - Market Geese - May 25- July 31 (pen of 2 males)

096 - Market Turkeys - May 11 - July 31 (pen of 2 males)

097 - Market Eggs with Production Hen - Exhibitors must exhibit 1 production hen from the previous year's standard pullet project (hatch date Feb 15, 2025) with eggs. On Sunday night check-in Exhibitors must bring the dozen eggs in the carton that they wish to have judged. These eggs will be transferred to a clear carton, provided by the Jr. Fair Board. Eggs cannot be removed from the barn once checked in and will be disposed of on Sunday during release. An additional fresh dozen of eggs must be provided by the exhibitor on sale day.

Department Specific Rules:

1. Breeding stock for Born and Raised Market Rabbits; May 15; All other breeding and pet rabbits: June 1; Independent Market Rabbits: August 1
2. Due to lack of storage space in the rabbit barn, all exhibitors will be required to pay \$3.00 per pen for shavings for each rabbit exhibited. This can be paid at the time of check-in on Sunday evening. This will entitle you to clean shavings for the entire period of the fair. Pens are expected to be clean.
3. All exhibitors are responsible for providing feed and water for their rabbits and cleaning cages daily.
4. Pen space is not to be used for feed or supplies. Barn personnel will do their best to provide each exhibitor with space below their cage to store feed and supplies. No fair boxes are permitted in the rabbit barn due to space restrictions.
5. A maximum of 7 pens may be exhibited at the Fair. Breeding/ Pet Rabbits – up to 5 rabbits; Market Rabbits – maximum of 2 pens (2 fryers, 2 meat pens or combination thereof). Each meat pen/fryer counts as one (1) pen. Up to 10 entries can be made online prior to July 15th but the number of rabbits/ pens that are exhibited at the fair must not exceed these maximums.
6. A maximum of 7 pens may be exhibited at the fair. Breeding/Pet Rabbits – up to 5 rabbits; Market Rabbits – maximum of 2 pens (2 fryers, 2 meat pens or combination thereof). Each meat pen/fryer counts as one (1) pen. Up to 10 entries can be made online prior to July 15th but the number of rabbits/pens that are exhibited at the fair must not exceed the maximums listed above
7. No doe and litter combinations are to be exhibited.
8. Only rabbits classified as “meat-type” rabbits should be entered in the meat pen and fryer classes.
9. Meat pen and fryer rabbits may not be shown in any other class.
10. Tattooing will be available for all rabbits during 4-H livestock interview judging on August 2nd or other designated date determined by the Rabbit Jr. Fair Advisory Board. All rabbits (including pet rabbits) must be tattooed to be exhibited at the fair and can be tattooed at this time. Meat pen and fryer rabbits must have their own tattoo and not be identical to the other rabbits in the meat pen or fryer combination, and tattoo ID’s must be provided during check-in on Sunday. No exceptions.
11. Exhibitors should make online entry by July 15th without tattoo number since rabbits cannot be tattooed until August.
12. All permanent earmarks or tattoos must be in left ear and legible.
13. Each breed of rabbit will have their own class during the Jr. Fair rabbit show. Only ARBA recognized breeds will be eligible for a Best of Breed award.
14. Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion Over All Breeds will be determined from Best of Breed rabbits.

15. The Grand Champion Over All Breeds rabbit cannot be shown at the fair the following year by any exhibitor.
16. A meat pen will consist of three rabbits from the same breed and variety. They can weigh no less than 3.5 pounds each and no more than 5.5 pounds each and cannot be over 12 weeks or 84 days old.
17. A fryer rabbit can weigh no less than 3.5 pounds and no more than 5.5 pounds and cannot be over 12 weeks or 84 days old.
18. All meat pens and fryers will be weighed on arrival at the fair by the weigh master. Up to 2 re-weighs will be allowed during check in for over and underweight rabbits.
19. All overweight and underweight market rabbits will have their own class but will not be considered for grand champion or reserve grand champion. The overweight and underweight market rabbits will be eligible to participate in the livestock sale.
20. All rabbits sold at the Jr. Fair Sale must leave the fairgrounds with buyer or base bid buyer. No rabbits are to be brought onto the fairgrounds on Sunday of the fair for the purpose of selling them.
21. Born & Raised Meat Pen or Born & Raised Fryer Rabbit Classes:
- MUST be tattooed by a Wyandot County Fair designated person with a designated tattoo during livestock interview judging on August 2nd.
 - The breeding doe/buck must be in the exhibitor's possession by May 15th. Doe must be bred May 15th or after for meat pen to be no more than 84 days old by the Wyandot County Fair.
 - To be able to exhibit a born & raised meat pen or born & raised fryer, each exhibitor must exhibit at least one rabbit from their breeding project of one buck or doe of the same breed as the meat pen or fryer.
 - Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion Born & Raised Meat Pen and Born & Raised Fryers will be selected and they must be sold in the Jr. Fair Livestock Sale.
- Independent Meat Pen or Independent Fryer Rabbit Classes:
- The Independent Meat Pen or Independent Fryer must be in the exhibitor's possession by August 1st.
 - Each Jr. Fair exhibitor can tattoo no more than 7 rabbits to be used in their Independent Meat Pen and Independent Fryer exhibits.
 - Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion Independent Meat Pen and Independent Fryers will be selected and they must be sold in the Jr. Fair Livestock Sale.
22. All rabbits need to be picked up from the barn within two hours after the release time on Sunday.

1. All sheep must be tagged with USDA Scrapie tag before Sunday at check in.
2. All market lambs must be tagged by the Jr. Fair on the first Saturday in June. Weigh in is not mandatory for those who do not wish to participate in rate of gain.
3. Each exhibitor may only exhibit 2 market lambs per class but may tag up to 4 market lambs per class. With family tagging any child within that family may choose from the total number that were tagged per class.
4. All exhibitors wishing to show in the Pair of Market Lambs class must enter each lamb on an individual entry in the 140/141 class. An individual entry form must be completed with the 142 class as a pair.
5. All market lambs are to be slick shorn before check in at the fair and no earlier than 10 days before show day. If this rule is not followed, the lamb will be judged in their pen.
6. The minimum weight for market lambs is 85lbs. The Maximum weight for market lambs is 160lbs. Animals under or over these weights will not be considered for champion or reserve champion. They may sell at the Jr. Fair Livestock Sale.
7. Up to two reweighs before 7:00p.m. on check in night will be allowed for over and under weight lambs. All sheep must weigh in on the same scale by the same weighmaster for the original weigh and any reweighs.

Wyandot County Born Market Lamb Class

1. No Jr. Fair hogs will be allowed to be shown in the open class Swine Show.
2. Exhibitors can exhibit 2 hogs, either barrow/gilt, barrow/barrow, or gilt/gilt at the fair.
3. This is a non-terminal show and sale (base bid will be allowed).
4. Out of state hogs will follow state fair rules.
5. Nipple waterers that are no larger 6in. In diameter and no taller than 32in. are allowed. There will be no permanent modifications allowed to be made to the gates or pens to allow use of waterer.
6. Hogs will be kept in the pen they were assigned to so the number on the card matches the ear tag.
7. No feeding at the wash area. No cleaning of feed pans at the wash area.
8. All market hogs will be weighed during Sunday night check in. Market hogs have a minimum weight of 220lbs and a maximum weight of 290lbs. Up to two reweighs will be allowed during check in for hogs that weigh in within 10lbs of these limits. A 3lbs allowance will be permitted. Hogs must be weighed in consecutively.
9. Over and under weight hogs will have their own class that will not be considered for champion or reserve champion, but will be eligible to participate in the livestock sale.
10. No clipping of hogs will be permitted in the barn or on the fairgrounds.
11. This is a water only show. No oil or oil based products will be permitted on the fairgrounds at anytime. Water soluble products are only allowed to wash and clean the swine. Anyone who uses prohibited products will be disqualified from showing.
12. Barn will be closed during the show.
13. No cleaning of pens until all hogs are released from the hog barn.
14. Jr. Fair Swine Production Contest:
 - Requirements:
 - One pair of hogs per exhibitor (any combination of gilt and/or barrow)
 - Minimum weight of 220lbs per hog
 - Hogs must be identified at June weigh-in
 - Hogs must comply with all Jr. Fair and Swine Department rules
 - Evaluation Criteria:
 - 60% - Average Daily Gain
 - 40% - Production Quality (muscling, Structure, soundness, health, design, balance)

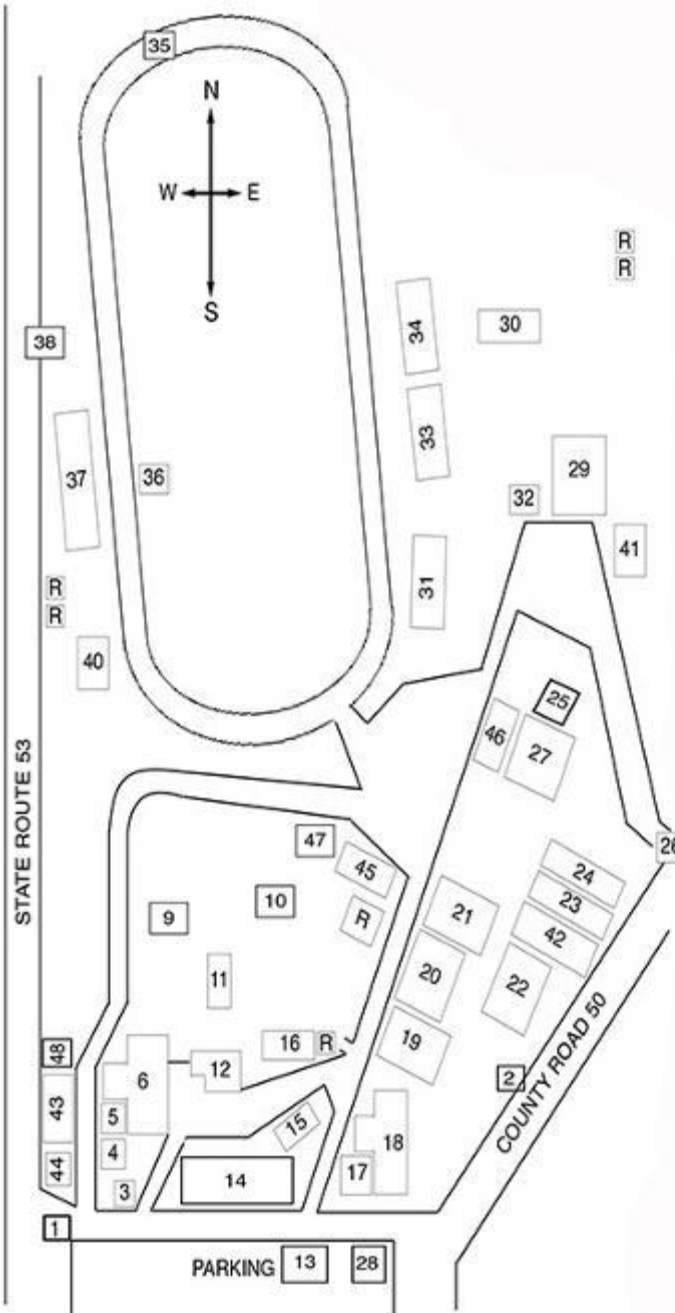
