In Honor of

Tom Needs

All good things must come to an end, and that's the case for longtime Wyandot County Senior Fair Board member Tom Needs, who represented Crane Township on the board for 47 years.

Tom Grew up in Wyandot County. He was an eight year member of 4-H then went on to to get his teaching degree from Bluffton College, where he met his wife Janel. They celebrated their 50th anniversary in 2019. He taught at Plymouth School District for 4 years and then at Upper Sandusky for 26 years where he proudly started their special education program.

Following in his grandfather's footsteps, Tom joined the Wyandot County Senior Fair board in 1977. His first year as a member of the board was a memorable one.

"The first year I was on the fair board, it rained and rained and rained. Back then we didn't have the tar and chipped walkways. It was all mud, and there were indentations in the ground in front of the of the food trailers, so it was all water and mud and no one wanted to stand in it to order or pick up food. We ended up bringing in truckloads and truckloads of sawdust to try to fill those in."

When Tom first started he had some unique responsibilities with the fair board.

"I was put in charge of the camping. At that time, it was a real hassle, especially with the carnies, because you had to get to the trailer, knock on the door, and try to collect their rent money for the fair. That was before golf carts , so it was a long way to walk from the local people down on the south side, then the local people in the horse area, then the carnies were on Ohio 53 and some of them would hide behind their booths at the fair. I used to get up on the ferris wheel and look down to see what campers were kind of hidden. Then when you went to the door to knock, they wouldn't come to the door because they knew why you were there. You'd have to go back again and again until you got somebody. Now that all gets taken care of with the contract in the fair office." On top of camping, Tom was in charge of rabbits and goats while also helping out with all general activities and events. He's also been in charge of the parade, maintaining the grandstands and even measuring lots and placing stakes for the camping area.

For the past six years, Needs has served the fair board as its treasurer. The ladies that counted the money retired right before he started as treasurer, and although he said that made his first year as treasurer a "nightmare", he did a great job that year and every year since then.

Tom enjoyed some unique experiences he would not have had if he hadn't served on the board, as well as being thankful for meeting so many people over the years.

"I got to participate in my first butchering through the fair. They used to do a big sausage fundraiser and I helped butcher pig carcasses, cutting meat off bones to get them ground into sausages and helped make prok cracklings out of pig skins, snouts and more. That was all new to me. I hated to see the sausage fundraiser go, because it was a community thing that people enjoyed, but now we've got the reverse raffle instead and they make 10 times more than we ever did making sausage. They say the only person who likes change is a wet, dirty baby but that was a good change."

"It was wonderful getting to meet people over the years on the fair board. The board is made up from people in townships all over the county. I've had a chance to meet a lot of interesting people. It used to be almost entirely composed of farmers and their stay-at-home wives. It's a lot more diverse now."

While many things have changed of the years, he's thankful that many of the Wyandot County Fair's traditions have stuck around.

"I'm glad Wyandot County Fair is still a fair and not a carnival. I also love how the buildings have been maintained so nicely with new ones added. It's been my privilege to serve the people of Wyandot County on the senior fair board."

As Tom's daughters reminisced on his time serving the fair they said, "He was always an example of a servant leader, deeply rooted in his faith. You can't separate my parents from their faith in everything they do. My mom supported my dad in many ways as he served. They definitely are a team! He served on many committees at our church but was also very intentional to be

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active in other community areas. Being on the fair board was important to him because he believed in the mission of the county fair, to build community and develop leaders. His grandfather had served on the fair board, and he valued that history. He enjoyed his own young 4-H and fair experiences and wanted to be a part of continuing that legacy. He enjoyed being a part of a good team, with many people with different gifts and talents working together for a common goal. He believed that the Wyandot County Fair was one of the best in the state and wanted to be part of the team that continued to make that happen. Dad loves seeing people get together and celebrate; the county fair was a yearly event that brought the community together. He also showed us that everything of value takes a lot of hard work and effort, and many hard-working people are behind the scenes. His example modeled both the importance and value of serving and also recognizing and appreciating the service of others. His service has had an impact that is positive and long-lasting. I am sure he and my mom look forward to enjoying the fair experience this year together."

The Senior Fair Board and the entire Wyandot County Fair community is thankful for Tom's many years of service, and we look forward to seeing his smiling face enjoying the 2024 Wyandot County Fair!





On June 18, 1939, Vernon was born in Carey, Ohio, the second of five children of the late Delmar and Helen Mae (Austin) Grubel. Vernon married the love of his life, Ruthann (Rader) Karg, and they shared 35 years of marriage and a beautiful combined family.

A farmer through and through, Vernon proudly spent his life working the land on his family's Century Farm. He loved everything about agriculture, and he was always trying to learn as much as he could, reading anything farm related he could get his hands on. He also loved John Deere tractors, and he enjoyed collecting mementos with the John Deere logo to display at their home and on the farm. His family joked that "he bled green and yellow," and that he "was true to the brand." To help fill time, Vernon also worked as a bus driver. He first worked for McCuthenville, now Mohawk Schools, and then drove bus for the Seneca County Opportunity Center. He shared a special relationship with everyone he ever worked with, and they all endearingly knew him simply as "Vern." They all had so much fun together at work, always trying to outdo each other's orneriness. He looked forward to every "Scutch Bunch" get together, which they did for years.

Whenever Vernon managed to get away from the farm, he loved

going to any fair he could find. He was proud of the accomplishment of visit all of the State Fairs east of the Mississippi, and he made it to all of the county and independent fairs in Ohio. His favorite fair though was the Wyandot County Fair, and he enjoyed serving on the Wyandot County Fair Board for 12 years. He was a member of the Wyandot County 4-H Club for 10 plus years and later became a 4-H advisor for another 10 plus years.






That George Collet never met a stranger was never more evident than his time at the Wyandot County Fair. And sadly, in 2023, when he did not feel like going to the county fair, we knew his time with us was short. Dad LOVED the fair from being an exhibitor as a youth to being a 4-H advisor to his time on the Senior Fair Board – he loved every minute of it.

Dad graduated from Nevada High School in 1956 and was a United States Army Veteran. He married Janis Brodman and they were married for 52 years until mom passed away in 2014. Mom was a lifelong Wyandot County resident herself and so the fair was inevitably a very large part of our lives. Dad was a lifelong farmer and retired from Whirlpool after 35 years. He was a member of St. Mary's Catholic Church in Kirby, and the Wharton Lions Club where he was past president. He served on the Council on Birth Defects for over 30 years, and on the Farm Bureau Board where he had been president. He and mom, Janis Collet, were 4-H advisors for 10 years as well as advisors to Farm Bureau Youth Council.

As a 4-H member himself, he and his siblings would come to the Wyandot County Fair and thoroughly enjoyed themselves. Hearing the stories from dad was one thing but to hear the stories from our aunts and uncles truly showed how important the fair was to the Collet family. Dad even had the grand champion hog one year!

As my brother, John, and I grew up, 4-H became a large part of our lives. Both of us were 4-H members and members of the Farm Bureau Youth Council. We both served as members of the Junior Fair Board – John was even president. And our parents were very proud when we both served as Wyandot Fair King and Queen respectively. We literally lived at the fair during fair week. And with mom's birthday always being during the fair, we always had reason to celebrate at the fair. Who could pass up a birthday cake from Dorothy Pool while visiting the fair? Not us. We also passed along the love of 4-H to all four of mom and dad's grandchildren. My children, Sarah and Zach, participated in Fairfield County, and John's children, Annika and Lydia, are current members in Muskingum County. But all four would agree that the Wyandot County Fair is The County Fair. So please enjoy this year's county fair as Dad would have wanted you to do. This would, of course, include a milk shake from the Junior Fair lunch stand and seeing as many of the animals being shown as possible starting with the goats of course.

Dewey Hetzel was born in Wyandot County in 1940, and has attended the Wyandot County Fair many of the years since then. For many years you could find Dewey's antique tractors, that he proudly restored, on display at the Wyandot County Fair.

Dewey was a bus mechanic for the Mohawk School System for 32 years and also farmed with his brother, Ron Hetzel. He was a 1958 graduate of Sycamore High School,

a member of the Sycamore United Methodist Church, a charter member of the International Harvestor Collectors, charter member of the International Harvestor Collectors of Ohio, Chapter 6, member of the Northwest Ohio Antique Association and past president three times, member of the Indian Mill Antique Association, and a lifetime member of the Tri-State Antique Association of Portland, Indiana.

Dewey was the father of four children: Lowell E. (Peggy) Hetzel, Mark A. (Judith) Hetzel, Jeffrey L. (Linda) Hetzel, Joel R. (Jennifer) Hetzel. He was also the grandfather of nine grandchildren, great grandfather of twenty-one great grandchildren, and the greatgreat grandfather of two great-great grandchildren.





Roger Bowen loved the Wyandot County Fair. Why? Because to him and many others, the Wyandot County Fair was the BEST county fair in Ohio! During Fair Week, he could be found somewhere on the fairgrounds.

Roger took pride in arranging the Bowen Implement display on Equipment Row. Lining up the tractors, combines, and equipment, during the following week he would talk to farmers about the new and latest

advances in the Oliver, White Farm, Steiger, Bush Hog, and other farm equipment lines he sold. Inside the old Army tent, he placed old bus seats for people to come relax a bit or warm up beside the old Salamander heater.

But the best part of Fair Week was visiting with people. Roger loved to talk. Whether talking with people representing his business, answering the call for help from the fair board, helping people in his sheriff's auxiliary uniform, driving tired fairgoers to their car on the golf cart, or supporting the youth of Wyandot County at the livestock shows and sale, he enjoyed the fair week with young and old alike. Simply, Roger just loved the Wyandot County Fair – the Best Fair in Ohio!

CONSTITUTION OF THE WYANDOT COUNTY AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY

ARTICLE I. This organization shall be know by the name of the Wyandot County Agricultural Society, and its object is to promote and encourage agriculture, horticulture and stock raising; together with all other industrial and educational interests of the county.

ARTICLE II. Section 1. The Board of Directors shall consist of 21 (twenty one) members. (1) one from each township plus 8 at large, with no limit on the number from any one township. The directors shall be elected for the term of 3 (three) years and so arranged that one-third (1/3) of the members shall be elected each year. All directors must be members of the society.

Section 2. The annual election of members of the board of directors shall be held on the grounds of the Wyandot County Agricultural Society on the Saturday during the fair between the hours of noon and 4 p.m.

Article III. Section 1. Any resident of Wyandot County 18 years of age and over who has purchased a membership ticket is entitled to vote for directors of the agricultural society.Section 2. Membership tickets may be purchased at any time throughout the year until the first day of the fair at the secretary's office.

Section 3. Members of the Wyandot County Agricultural Society must declare their candidacy for the office of a director of the society by filing a petition signed by 10 or more current year members. The petition must be filed with the secretary of the society at least 10 (ten) days before the annual election. Only candidates who have met the filing requirements will be eligible for election as a director.

Section 4. Blank petitions shall be furnished by the agricultural society and shall be obtained from the secretary of the society.

Section 5. The board of directors shall meet annually in November for the purpose of electing all officers. The term of director shall start on the 15th day of November of the year elected. The term of office shall start immediately after the election.

Section 6. The secretary shall be employed by the board of directors for a term not to exceed three years and may or may not be a member of the board of directors but must be a member of the society. The treasurer shall be employed by the board for a term of one year and be a member of the society. All other officers shall be elected for a term of one year and be members of the board of directors.

Section 7. All officers shall hold their offices until their successors are elected and qualified. **ARTICLE IV.** The president and vice president shall be members of the board of directors. The president of the society shall preside at all meetings of the society and of the board, and discharge such other duties as pertain to his office, and in his absence the vice president shall discharge the duties of his office.

ARTICLE V. The secretary shall keep a roll of members and conduct the correspondence of the society. He shall make a careful record of all meetings and all business done by the board of directors, together with the report of all committees appointed, and place such reports on file in a book kept for such purposes. He shall keep a book showing an account of all monies coming to said board from which and from what source it came. He shall also keep an itemized account of all money paid out for what purpose. He shall receive all monies due or coming to said board and pay the same to the treasurer, and take a receipt for the same and perform such duties as prescribed by the state board of agriculture and receive such compensations as fixed by the board of directors.

ARTICLE VI. The treasurer shall receive all monies from the secretary collected for membership fees or otherwise; also he shall receive all monies from tickets sold during exhibition of the society, and make an annual report to the board of directors at the regular annual meeting and receive such compensation as fixed by the board of directors.

ARTICLE VII. A list of articles for which premiums are to be awarded shall be published in premium list in accordance with such rules and regulations as the board of directors may prescribe.

ARTICLE VIII. All articles offered for premiums shall be in accordance with such rules and regulations as the board of directors may prescribe.

ARTICLE IX. Such superintendents of the various departments as the board of directors deem necessary shall be appointed by the president and confirmed by the board of directors. **ARTICLE X.** It shall be the duty of the society to arrange for security to protect property and exhibits.

ARTICLE XI. "No person shall be permitted to make solicitations of any nature on the fairgrounds except in contracted concession or commercial rented spaces. No person will be permitted to post or display signs, distribute handbills or advertise material or sell or distribute free, any merchandise, except persons under contract."



BYLAWS

A majority of the members of the board of directors shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

The regular meetings of the board shall be set by the board during the November meeting each year. Special meetings may be called as often as necessary.

Exhibitors, not residents of Wyandot County, upon purchase of an exhibitor ticket shall be entitled to compete for premiums, but must conform to and be governed by the rules of the Wyandot County Agricultural Society, and State Department of Agriculture of Ohio. Any person, a resident of Wyandot County, may compete for premiums in any department, or make an exhibit by purchasing a membership ticket, and complying to the rules of the Wyandot County Agricultural Society and State Department of Agriculture of Ohio.

ALL ARTICLES ENTERED FOR PERMIUMS MUST BE IN THE NAME OF THE BONAFIDE OWNER.

- Any member of the board who shall, by virtue of his official position, use any means to defeat an impartial reward shall, on conviction thereof, forfeit his membership, and the board shall appoint his successor.
- Any person who, by letter or otherwise, attempts to interfere with the committees during their adjustments, will be excluded from competition, and if the premium in anyway has, in the opinion of the board of directors, been obtained by fraud such premiums shall be withheld.
- Protests made of the violations of these rules must be submitted in writing, accompanied by a \$75 fee, and presented to the secretary's office no later than the next regular meeting. If the protest is upheld by a majority vote of the directors, the fee will be returned. If the protest is denied, the fee is forfeited.
- Diligence will be used by the board to prevent injury to or loss of property, but they will not be responsible for any damage, injury or loss that may occur.
- If any disrespect is shown to the award or to the awarding committee by the exhibitor or his agent he shall forfeit all the awards made to him, and it shall be the duty of the member in charge to report the same to the board at its first subsequent meeting.
- Premium cards have no values as to the payment of premiums, as premiums are paid only by the records of the judges' book and from which there shall be no appeal.
- No ribbons or awards of any description will be allowed in any livestock barn until all judging in that department is completed.
- Concessions and exhibitors shall have all supplies delivered to their space before 10 a.m. each day.
- All bills other than regular bills for material, labor, etc., must be signed by the person or people ordering same if ok, if not correct must be brought before the board of directors, if not so signed not to be paid. No order given on the treasury until so signed.
- This constitution and bylaws may be amended by a majority of the board of directors at a scheduled meeting voting in favor of placing an amendment on the ballot at the annual election.

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RULES AND REGULATIONS

(Will be enforced to the letter if possible)

- Exhibitors should examine the following rules in order to understand the manner in which the fair will be conducted. Particular attention is called to the date of the closing of entries in the different departments which will be September 1st.
- Special attention is called to people contemplating making exhibits, that the secretary will be at the secretary's office at the fairgrounds, Upper Sandusky, Ohio, starting July 15th, Monday, Wednesday, Thursday from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., then beginning August 5th open Mon Fri 8a.m. 4p.m. so as to give those desirous of making entries before the rush of the last days previous to the opening. Online entry begins July 16th.
- ALL ANIMALS AND ARTICLES FOR PREMIUMS MUST BE OWNED BY THE PERSON ENTER-ING THE SAME, OR SOME MEMBER OF HIS OR HER FAMILY, PROPERLY CLASSIFIED AND IN PROPER POSITION BY 6 A.M. MONDAY, IF NOT THEY MAY BE EXCLUDED FROM COMPETITON OR POSITION AS THE SUPERINTENDENT OF THE DEPARTMENT MAY DIRECT.
- An animal entered in one class cannot compete for premium in any other except sweepstakes,

or in one of a pair, or herd, and must be owned by one person or farm.

- Directors of other officially appointed people shall act as superintendents of the different departments, and are empowered to decide all questions not covered by these rules arising in their several departments.
- No unsound or unworthy animal or article will be allowed to compete for a premium in any class except the speed ring.
- All protests of awards for premiums must be in writing and shall be filed with the secretary before noon on Monday after the fair.
- When the entry of an article or animal is recorded in the books of the secretary, cards will be given with the number and class which are to be placed on the article or animal. When once entered no changes will be made after September 1st.
- Should any premium be found to have been obtained by false evidence or misrepresentation or a violation of the above rules and money will be withheld by the board. No exhibitors can win more than two prizes in one class.
- Stalls and pens for horses, cattle, sheep and swine will be assigned by the superintendent in charge. NO STALLS WILL BE ASSIGNED UNTIL ENTRIES ARE MADE, AND STALLS OR PENS ARE PAID FOR. Stalls and pens must be kept in clean and sanitary condition, subject to fair veterinarian's approval.
- In the case of general rules conflicting with rules and regulations of any department under which an animal or article is exhibited and said department rules will take precedence as regards said exhibit. Should any point be covered in the general rules and not in the department rules or vice versa, the same shall be considered as appearing in both. Department rules will be found at the head of each department.

No gambling, games of chance, immoral exhibitions or intoxicated people will be allowed on the grounds. No person will be allowed to sell or give away intoxicating drinks on the grounds. The above rule is in strict accordance with the state laws.

No tractor or other power unit will be allowed to run unattended on the Wyandot County Fairgrounds. They may only run in the parade, pulling contest, etc. Wheels are not to (be of a style that will damage the fairgrounds. Note: Due to insurance regulations – NO STEAM ENGINE MAY BE OPERATED ON THE FAIRGROUNDS.

All hay, grain and feeds will be handled under supervision of the fair board and any person having hay, grain and feed to sell, must see the man in charge.

Judges' books must be returned every evening to the secretary's office.

Fair board reserves the right to prorate premiums in case of insufficient funds.

Entrance fee must be paid before space will be assigned or reserved.

All livestock trucks will be permitted on grounds at 11 a.m. Sunday, September 8. All deliveries on the fair grounds will be made before 10 a.m. and after 11:00 p.m. All premium checks not cashed by expiration date will be voided.

- Golf cart authorization. NO UNAUTHORIZED GOLF CARTS WILL BE PERMITTED ON THE FAIR GROUNDS AFTER 10 A.M. DURING THE FAIR.
- Authorized Golf carts: SR. FAIR BOARD, SHERIFF & AUXILARY, EMS, FIRE DEPT., ELEC-TRICTION & SOUND,
- The Wyandot County Agricultural Society assumes no responsibility for damage to or loss of parked vehicles or personal property contained within parked vehicles.

The Wyandot County Fair Trailer Parks will consist of four parks.

-The west park, along Ohio 53, which will be available to overnight campers with fair employment.

All campers must return their contract by July 1, with payment of \$230.00. This fee includes the camper space plus one fair pass in the name that is on the contract. If a second car pass is needed you will have to provide proof of a second fair pass and the license plate number of the vehicle to the office before September 1st.

Each lot provides for a camping outfit and one car.

Electricity and water are furnished.

- No camper can be moved onto their assigned lot before the Thursday before the fair unless special permission has been granted from a superintendent in charge. No electric will be turned on until Thursday before the fair.
- All rented camping sited **must** have a camper on the site. It can not be used for just parking & fair supplies.

- Junior Fair Entries must be entered online only from May 15 and close July 15 at https:// wyandot.fairwire.com
 - Open Class Entries must be entered online or entry form starting July 16 and close September 1st. NO entry will be received or changed to another class after that time. Enter Open Class Entries online at https://wyandotsfo.fairwire.com
 - Entries once made although in error of class, or otherwise, will not be changed except upon recommendation from the superintendent of the department. This rule will be enforced to avoid error in the judges' entry books.
 - The judges will report at 9 a.m. on the day on which the classes they are to inspect, will report at the secretary's office, where he or she will be registered and receive books.
 - All awards will be made by the single judge system unless the board of directors deems it proper to do otherwise and in making the awards you will, as far as practicable, state the grounds for your preference.
 - Judges shall make all awards with unbiased opinion, and such award shall be strictly upon the merit of the article displayed. Whenever animals for premiums are offered, it shall be the duty of the superintendent of the various departments to check their books with exhibitors at the time of judging as no book will be changed after being returned to the secretary's office.
 - No premium will be awarded in any department unless the judge thinks the animals or articles worthy of same.
 - The members in charge of each department will give proper notice of time and place, where such class will exhibit for the awarding premiums. All livestock not present at

the time and place designated SHALL FORFEIT IT'S RIGHT and the judge shall place awards same as if animal or article were not entered.

- NO JUDGE OR PERSON IS PERMITTED TO CHANGE AN AWARD AFTER PREMIUM RIBBON OR CARD IS ATTACHED TO ANIMAL OR ARTICLE UNLESS FRAUD OR MISREPRESEN-TATION IS FOUND.
- In livestock, you take into consideration the symmetry, early maturing, size, age, feeding, and other circumstances connected with animals you may judge. BUT GIVE NO EN-COURAGEMENT TO OVERFEEDING. ALL UNSOUND ANIMALS ARE DISQUALIFIED FROM EXHIBITION.
- On questions or disputes, you are expected to consult the member in charge, and permit no person to interfere with our deliberations, and will confer a favor by reporting all such interference to member in charge, who in turn shall report to the secretary's office.
- JUDGES ON LIVESTOCK WILL NOT MAKE THEIR AWARD UNTIL THE LIVESTOCK IS ALL REVIEWED IN EACH CLASS. YOU WILL THEN ATTACH TO ALL LIVESTOCK TAKING FIRST PREMIUM A BLUE RIBBON, TO ALL SWEEPSTAKES A PURPLE RIBBON AND IF NO AWARD, WRITE "NOT WORTHY" OR "NOT FOUND" AS THE CASE MAY BE. 2024 HEALTH CERTIFICATES

All horses and beef or dairy feeders exhibited at the Wyandot County Fair must be accompanied by a health certificate certified by an accredited veterinarian. Inspection and Health Requirements of Livestock Exhibited in Ohio.

Rule 901:1-18-01. CHAPTER'S APPLICATION

- Animals listed in this chapter when moved or imported into Ohio for exhibition purposes only shall comply with the requirements of this chapter and when in compliance with the provisions of this chapter shall, with the exception of rules governing movement and importation of quarantined animals, be exempt from any other rules governing movement within or importation into Ohio.
- Animals moved within or imported into Ohio for any purpose in addition to exhibition shall meet all movement and import requirements of Chapter 901:1-1-17 of the administrative code.

901:1-18-02 DEFINITIONS.

As used in this chapter:

- "Exhibition" means any public show of animals which is sponsored by or under the control of an Ohio county or independent agricultural society organized under Chapter 1711 of the Revised Code; or the Ohio State Fair, and all preview and jackpot shows.
- "Certificate of Veterinary Inspection" means a form from the state of origin which has been issued and completed by a licensed accredited veterinarian attesting to the health status and identification of an animal listed thereon.
- "Approved Veterinarian" means any licensed and accredited veterinarian approved by the Ohio Department of Agriculture, or an employee of the Ohio Department of the Ohio Department of Agriculture or the United States Department of Agriculture, Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service, Veterinary Services.
- "Licensed and Accredited Veterinarian" means a person who is licensed by the State of Ohio to practice veterinary medicine and who is certified by the United States Department of Agriculture, Agricultural Research Service, to be and accredited veterinarian.
- "Residue" means any poisonous or deleterious pesticide governed by 40 C.F.R. 109.6 or any other substance governed by 21 C.F.R. 556.
- "Contagious or Infectious Disease" means any disease, including any foreign animal disease, or vector, capable of transmission by any means from a carrier animal to a human or to another animal and includes dangerously contagious or infectious diseases.
- "Tuberculosis Accredited Free Herd" is one that has passed at least two consecutive annual negative official tests for tuberculosis in accordance with the "Uniform Methods and Rules-Bovine Tuberculosis Eradication", and has no other evidence of bovine tuberculosis.

901:1-18-03 EXHIBITIONS: SANITATION, INSPECTION AND RECORDS

- Each entity sponsoring an exhibition shall have in attendance an approved veterinarian for the duration of the exhibit.
- Each entity sponsoring an exhibition shall:
 - Immediately prior to an exhibition and under the direction of the approved veterinarian, thoroughly clean and disinfect each building, pen, stall, ring or other enclosure in which animals are to be quartered for exhibition.
 - Have the approved veterinarian:
 - Examine the certificate of veterinary inspection of each animal brought to the exhibition.
 - Inspect within a reasonable time of arrival each animal brought to the exhibit for symptoms of any contagious or infectious diseases.
 - Daily inspect each animal present at the exhibition for symptoms of contagious or infectious disease.
 - Maintain a record for one year from the date of the exhibition of each animal present at the exhibit. The record shall contain the name and address of the owner of each animal and the species and breed of the animal.
 - May order the immediate removal of any animal which in the opinion of the approved veterinarian is afflicted with or exhibits symptoms of being afflicted with a contagious or infectious disease or residue.
- An exemption from the requirements of paragraph (B) (1) of this rule may be requested from the department and will be granted when, in the judgement of the department, cleaning and disinfection will serve no purpose. By way of example only, cleaning and disinfection will generally serve no purpose in a newly constructed building that has never been occupied.

901:18-04 EXHIBITORS.

- No person shall present for exhibition or exhibit an animal which he knows or has reason to suspect is affected with or has been exposed to a dangerously contagious or infectious disease or residue.
- The owner or bailee of an animal with symptoms of an infectious or contagious disease shall, when directed by an exhibition official, the approved veterinarian, or an employee of the Ohio Department of Agriculture, immediately remove the animal from the exhibition premises.
- Upon request, each person who presents for exhibition or exhibits an animal, shall make available any certificate of veterinary inspection, registration certificates, vaccination certificate, and other documents to exhibition officials, the approved veterinarian or an employee or the Ohio Department of Agriculture.
- Each person who presents for exhibition or exhibits and animal for which a certificate of veterinary inspection is required by rules 901:1-18-01 to 901:1-18-11 of the administrative code shall forward a copy of the certificate of veterinary inspection to the Ohio Department of Agriculture's Division of Animal Industry.

901:1-18-05 POULTRY AND FOWL

- All turkeys, chickens and game birds moved within or imported into Ohio for exhibition must:
 - Originate directly from a flock or hatchery which is a participant in the National Poultry Improvement Plan for the eradication of disease and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirement of this paragraph; or
 - Originate directly from a flock which has had a negative test for pullorum/fowl typhoid disease within 12 months preceding the opening date of exhibition and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirement of this paragraph; or
 - Have had a negative test for pullorum/fowl typhoid disease, within 90 days, preceding the opening date of the exhibition and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirement of this paragraph; or
 - Be tested for pullorum/fowl typhoid disease upon arrival at the exhibition by a tester approved by the Ohio Department of Agriculture and found negative.
- The rapid whole blood test shall not be used to test turkeys for compliance with the requirements of paragraphs (A) (2), (A) (3), (A) (4) of this rule.
- Waterfowl, doves and pigeons are exempt from this rule.

901:1-18-06 CATTLE

- All cattle moved within Ohio for exhibition:
 - The animals presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
- All cattle imported into Ohio for exhibition must:
 - Be accompanied by a certificate or veterinary inspection issued within 30 days preceding the opening date of the exhibition; and
- Unless from a tuberculosis-accredited herd, a tuberculosis-free state or under 6 months of age, be negative to a caudal fold tuberculosis test administered by a licensed accredited veterinarian within 30 days preceding the opening date of the exhibition; and
 - If originate from a modified accredited state or zone must comply with Rule 901:1-17-03 of the Administrative Code;
 - If originate from an accreditation preparatory or non-accredited state or zone are prohibited from exhibition;
 - If from a brucellosis class A state or area must be negative to an official brucellosis test within 30 days of the opening date of the exhibition unless; they are under 6 months of age, steers or official vaccinates under 20 months of age (daily) or 24 months of age (beef); and

- If from a brucellosis class B or C state or area must meet all requirements for preentry testing as specified in 9 C.F.R. 78.9 and obtain an Ohio permit prior to movement.
- Cattle from a brucellosis certified free herd or class free state are not required to be brucellosis tested.

901:1-18-07 GOATS

Goats moved within Ohio for exhibition:

- The animal presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
- All sexually intact animals and any wether eighteen months of age and older must be identified with an official identification as defined in rule 901:1-13-04 of the Ohio Administrative Code.

Goats imported into Ohio exhibition:

- Must have a certificate of veterinary inspection issued with 30 days preceding the exhibition opening date; and
- The animal presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
- The owner and the veterinarian must attest to the following statement written on the certificate of veterinary inspection "the goats in this shipment are not known to be under any movement restrictions because of scrapie."
- Originate from a tuberculosis accredited free herd as defined in rule 901:1-18-02 (G) of the Administrative Code for bovine tuberculosis eradication; or
- Originate from a bovine accredited free state or zone, or a bovine modified accredited advanced state or zone; or
- Originate from a bovine modified accredited state or zone must comply with rule 901:1-17-06 of the Administrative Code.
- If originate from a bovine accreditation preparatory or a bovine non-accredited state or zone are prohibited from exhibition.

901:1-18-08 HORSES, MULES, AND PONIES.

- Horses, mules and ponies moved within Ohio for exhibition:
 - If not under quarantine and if they are free of any signs of a contagious or infectious disease: and
 - If the animal is 12 months of age or older, the exhibition manager may require that the animal has been tested and classed negative to an official test for equine infectious anemia within 12 months of the closing date of the exhibition.
- Horses, mules and ponies imported into Ohio for exhibition:
 - Shall be accompanied by an official certificate of veterinary inspection issued within 30 days of the opening date of the exhibition; and
 - If the animal is 12 months of age or older, it shall be accompanied by evidence the animal was negative to an official test for equine infectious anemia within 12 months of the opening date of the exhibition; and
 - Upon request by an authorized representative of the Ohio Department of Agriculture, the person responsible for each animal must make available a chronological list of dates, places and events attended by this animal within 30 days prior to entry into Ohio.

901:1-18-09 SHEEP.

Sheep moved within Ohio for exhibition:

- The animal presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
- All sexually intact animals and any whether eighteen months of age and older must be identified with an official identification as defined in rule 901:1-13-04 of the Ohio Administrative Code.

Sheep imported into Ohio for exhibition:

- Must have a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within 30 days preceding the exhibition opening date; and
- The animal presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
- The owner and the veterinarian must attest to the following statement written on the certificate of veterinary inspection "the sheep in this shipment are not known to be under any movement restrictions because of scrapie."

901:1-18-10 SWINE.

Swine moved within Ohio for exhibition:

- The animals presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
- Will be exempt from the requirement of a certificate of veterinary inspection if they originate immediately and directly from a pseudorabies stage V area.
- Swine originating from a pseudorabies stage V area shall:

Be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days preceding the opening date of the exhibition: and

Originate from a pseudorabies qualified her; or

Be negative to an official pseudorabies test within thirty days of the exhibition. Swine imported into Ohio for exhibition:

- Must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued with thirty days preceding the opening date of the exhibition; and
 - Originate immediately and directly from a pseudorabies stage V area or an area or country recognized by the United States Department of Agriculture, animal plant health inspection service, veterinary services as pseudorabies free; or

Originate immediately and directly from a pseudorabies stage V area; or Are exempted by a written permit issued by the department.

Be negative to an official pseudorabies test within thirty days of the exhibition. **LLAMA.**

901:1-18-11 LLAMA.

- Camelids including, but to limited to, llama, alpacas and vicunas moved within Ohio for exhibition when presented for exhibition must show no evidence of contagious or infectious disease.
- Camelids including, but not limited to, llama, alpacas and vicunas imported into Ohio for exhibition:
 - Must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued with thirty days preceding the exhibition opening date and be identified with official individual identification.
 - When presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of contagious or infectious disease.

901:1-5-14 PROHIBITION OF STIMULATION OR MAKING APPEAR MORE SOUND ANIMALS ENTERED IN COMPETION.

No society shall permit the injection or administration:

- Of any drug of any kind or description or of the physical application of any electrical, mechanical or other appliance to stimulate any animal which is entered in any form of competition.
- To any animal, of any material which will conceal the true conformation or condition of said animal, or make said animal appear more sound than it actually is.

SHEEP AND GOAT EXHIBITION REQUIREMENTS

From The Ohio Department of Agriculture

NO PERSON MAY REMOVE OR TAMPER WITH OFFICIAL SHEEP AND GOAT IDENTIFICATION IN ACCORDANCE WITH 9 C.F.R. PART 79.2

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In order for Ohio to maintain Consistent State Status, Ohio sheep and goat exhibitions will be considered Interstate Commerce.

- Requirements for bringing sheep and goats into Ohio for exhibition, sale or breeding. Certificate of Veterinary inspection issued within thirty days of the opening date of the exhibition.
 - CVI must be signed by the owner and the veterinarian attesting to the following statement: "The sheep/goats in this shipment are not known to be under any movement restrictions because of scrapie."

Show no evidence of infectious or contagious disease.

- All sheep and goats must be identified with official USDA identification (USDAapproved sheep tags, USDA-approved tattoos or identification in the Scrapie Flock Certification Program).
- If the animal was born after Jan. 1, 2002, it must have official USDA sheep/goat identification and be identified to the flock of birth.
- Identification requirements for sexually intact sheep and goats moving within Ohio for exhibition, including sales:
 - Official USDA sheep/goat identification in the form of an approved tag or tattoo. If the animal was born after Jan. 1, 2002, it must have official USDA sheep/goat identification and be identified to the flock of birth either by an ear tag or tattoo placed by the owner of the flock of birth, or a tag or tattoo placed by the purchaser.
 - The identification requirements for flocks enrolled in the Voluntary Scrapie Flock Certification Program qualify as official USDA identification for exhibition and interstate movement; no other special identification is needed. Ohio sheep and goat wethers that are less than 18 months of age exhibited in Ohio do not require USDA identification.
- "Exhibition" means any public show of animals that is sponsored by or under the control of an Ohio county orindependent agricultural society OR the Ohio State Fair OR which is assembled for a period that exceeds 36 hours OR contains animals of origins other than Ohio. -- Includes show lamb and goat sales, consignment sales of livestock and jackpot shows.

Responsibilities of an exhibition sponsor (includes show lamb and goat sales, consignment sales of livestock and jackpot shows):

Must have an approved veterinarian.

Buildings, pens, stalls, rings and other enclosures in which animals are to be quartered for exhibition must be cleaned and disinfected prior to the exhibition under the direction of the approved veterinarian.

The approved veterinarian is required to:

Examine CVI when required; and

Inspect livestock for infectious or contagious diseases within a reasonable time of arrival; and Inspect livestock daily.

- May order the immediate removal of any animal that, in the opinion of the approved veterinarian, places other animals at unacceptable risk of disease.
- Maintain a record for one year from the date of the exhibition of each animal present at the exhibit. Sheep and goat sale records must be kept for 5 years. (See (F) below).
- For livestock purchased at an exhibition and moved out of state, an accredited veterinarian must issue a certificate of veterinary inspection before the animal moves across the state line.
- The Code of Federal Regulations requires that sheep and goat sale records be kept for 5 years by the seller, the buyer and the exhibition/sale sponsor. The records must contain the following information:

Name and address of the seller, telephone number if available;

Name and address of the buyer, telephone number if available;

Official identification when required as indicated in parts A and B of these requirements; And Date of Sale.





No one is permitted in the show area during the judging period; except judges, clerks and authorized persons.

Entries open to all amateur flower growers in Wyandot County and counties open to Wyandot County.

Entries Close September 1st

Each exhibitor must purchase an exhibitor's ticket or membership ticket.

Junior exhibitor entries must purchase a youth ticket.

Multiple entries permitted in house plant categories, provided each one is a different named specimen.

One entry per exhibitor in each specimen category.

All entries must be in place by 9:45 a.m on Tuesday Sept. 10th. Any placed after 9:45 a.m. will be for viewing only.

Exhibitors are responsible for all property.

All specimens must be displayed in clear glass containers/vase. Paper wedges should be used where needed to hold specimens in place such as gladiolus and dahlias.

Specimens must be identified.

Specimen flowers must be disbudded unless stated otherwise, shown with foliage and grown by exhibitor.

Fresh plant material must predominate unless stated otherwise in a class.

No wild feathers.

All specimens and arrangements must remain in place until Noon, Sunday Sept. 17. Ribbons will be awarded for three places. Rosettes for best of show will be awarded in classes as indicated.

Accessories for artistic design may be used as long as they are secured to the mechanics or base and are within the design itself. No artificial or painted flowers or foliage to be used unless a class so states it can.

In the open class the placement committee reserves the right to subdivide classes as needed.

Arrangements MUST be made before placed on display table.

In arrangement classes plant material should be identified and a 3x5 card placed interpreting the material. All entries must be named as to variety.

Arrangements are to be brought in ready for placement.

The judge may refuse to make any award for an unworthy exhibit, even though it may be the only one of the class in that particular entry.

Judges' decision is final.



---If a member of any Jr. Fair Organization has an animal that dies or cannot be brought to the fair (unruly, sick, etc.) exhibitor is required to complete a livestock entry and go through the interview judging process to receive a premium. On the Livestock Entry, enter "Poster Entry" in your department.

All poster entries must be checked in at the respective livestock department between 2-7 p.m. on Sunday, September 8th. Posters will be displayed in each species barn.

An entry, Exhibitor Pass and Exhibit are required to receive a Premium.

JUNIOR FAIR REQUIREMENTS

- The Jr. Fair is composed of the Wyandot County 4-H Clubs, FFA Chapters, FCCLA Chapters, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, School Art and School Industrial Art Departments. Entries are open to any girl or boy officially enrolled and in good standing in one or more of these groups in Wyandot County during the current year. Any FFA student residing in Wyandot County is eligible to exhibit at the Wyandot County Fair if approved by a Vo-Ag teacher. Students from Carey, Mohawk and Upper Sandusky Schools who are attending a joint vocational school are eligible to exhibit at the Wyandot County Fair if they meet all other requirements.
- If an exhibitor pass is not purchased before August 15, 2024, the exhibitor will have the opportunity to purchase a Youth Season Pass for \$15.00 until September 1st. If an exhibitor fails to meet the guidelines, they will not be eligible to exhibit.
- To be eligible, exhibitors must not have passed their 19th birthday on January 1st of the current year.
- The Jr Fair is under jurisdiction of the Jr. Fair Board with the Advisory Board and Senior Fair Board acting in a supervisory capacity. All rules and regulations pertaining to the general conduct of Sr. Fair also apply to Jr. Fair.
- The Advisory Board consists of Sr. Fair Board members, the Vocational Agriculture instructors, 4-H representatives, the extension educator, FCCLA, Scout Leaders, Art and Industrial Art teachers and department advisors.
- Jr. Fair Board members are high school students who are nominated by Jr. Fair organizations or departments of which they are currently active members or students. Appointment will be based on leadership, dependability and achievement. Jr. Fair Board members must be active members of a Jr. Fair organization or department for the duration of their terms. The term of office shall be two years. **However**, a member can re-apply and be a member of the Jr. Fair Board until they have not passed their 19th birthday by the first day of the year he/she would be on the board. This would allow youth to be on the board during their high school years.
- All Jr. Fair exhibits will be displayed or housed where designated by the superintendent in charge.
- Products exhibited must be from current projects carried in one of the Jr. Fair groups. Livestock, other than market animals, may be leased for the duration of the project or owned by the exhibitor. Exhibitors are responsible for his/her livestock project until the appropriate release time on Sunday.

--- Jr. Fair Dress Code – Requirements for all shows/aale. Pants/jeans with no holes. Full button up shirts, no polos, to be buttoned from bottom to at least two buttons from the collar and tucked in for all shows/sale. Livestock in the Jr. Fair will be released Sunday, September 15th. All animals will remain on the fairgrounds until their release time. Buyers have two hours after release time of that species to pick up animals or make arrangements with head of department.

Scrapies tags will be mandatory for goats and sheep. There will be no make-up tagging dates. Mandatory weigh-in and tagging for Swine Production will be June 15th.

Only one exhibit will be allowed per class, except in livestock classes where two will be allowed. Exhibitors may show only two animals in single classes.

No entry fee will be charged to enter the Jr. Fair classes.

The Fair Board is not responsible for an entry being lost, damaged or stolen. Exhibitors of the Jr. Fair may enter the open classes by conforming to those rules. The decision of a judge is final. Jr. Fair guidelines, rules and requirements will supersede those of any Jr. Fair organization.

- No one will be permitted to stay in Jr. Fair buildings or tents overnight unless special reason can be shown.
- Only exhibits receiving an "A" grade on projects which are graded will be eligible to compete for special awards. Only livestock projects receiving an "A" grade in the show ring will be eligible for grand or reserve champion awards.

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- When an exhibit is not deemed worthy of a special award the judges will make no award even though there may be no competition. At their discretion, the judges may award special awards.
- Jr. Fair exhibitors involved in more than one organization must exhibit separate and different projects in each organization.
- 4-H, FFA, FCCLA, Scouts, School Art and Industrial Arts departments are considered separate organizations.
- The following are some separate and different projects:

- Anyone exhibiting a project in another county's Jr. Fair is ineligible to exhibit the same project in Wyandot County's Jr. Fair. All exhibits are to be made in accordance with the exhibit guidelines for the respective projects.
- All exhibitors must abide by the rules of the Jr. Fair Board and the Wyandot County Agricultural Society or be expelled from the grounds.
- Jr. Fair Board members and advisory board members will serve as superintendents in the various departments and are empowered to decide all questions not covered by these rules. These decisions are made as a departmental group.
- Livestock Interview Judging is at the discretion of each Jr. Fair organization.
- All livestock and poultry exhibits must have pen or stall cleaned out within 72 hours following sale or will be penalized.
- Exhibitors must show own project. Any exhibitor showing an animal at the Wyandot County Jr. Fair must show his or her own animal and stay with that animal through completion of that class. The only exception will be a physical impairment accompanied by a written excuse from a doctor at least one (1) hour prior to show time, in which case a current Wyandot County Jr. Fair exhibitor can show the animal. The only other exception is an exhibitor with two (2) animals in the same class. Exhibitor will show own animal unless two (2) are in the same class, then another current Wyandot County Jr. Fair exhibitor can show the second animal.
- All Jr. Fair market lambs must be slick-shorn before weigh-in at the fair no earlier than 10 days prior to show day.

Premium monies will be available the day after your show starting Tuesday in the Jr Fair Office for Jr. Fair exhibitors who <u>purchased a pass, made an entry and</u> <u>exhibited a project(s)</u> during the Fair.

After the fair, premium money will be available for one week only at the Sr. Fair Office on Monday, Wednesday, Thursday from 8:30 a.m. – 2:30 p.m.

4-H Cloverbuds and Boy/Girl Scout premiums will be paid to the Club/Troop. Individual checks will not be issued.

All protests of awards for premiums must be in writing and shall be filed with Sr. Fair Board secretary before noon on the first Tuesday after the fair.

Procedure to file a complaint:

- Protest regarding any Jr. Fair competition shall be in writing by the party making protest.
- Protest regarding any Jr. Fair competition shall be submitted to the Jr. Fair Coordinator(s) no later than noon of the day following competition.
- Any party making a protest shall submit a fee of \$75.00 to the Jr. Fair Board.
- The fee shall be refunded only if the protest is sustained by the complaint committee of Wyandot County.
- The complaint committee will hold a meeting regarding the protest at which time the party may present evidence of arguments in support of their protest.
- The written decision of the complaint committee shall be finalized and served by mail on the party making the protest within 10 days of the date of hearing.

AGRICULTURAL REQUIREMENTS

Entries for all 4-H exhibits, School Arts and Industrial Arts, Engineering, Scouts, Livestock, Crops, and Gardening exhibits are to be made on line by July 15 at https://wyandot.fairwire.com. Late entries received after July 15 will be graded in the stall or pen and receive an A, B, or C grade. The project will not be eligible for any county awards and cannot sell in the sale ring. All health regulations pertaining to Sr. Fair livestock shall also apply to Jr. Fair livestock exhibits. Each exhibitor is responsible for the care and feeding of their animal at all times. Any exhibitor showing an animal at the Wyandot County Jr. Fair must show his or her own animal and stay with that animal for the completion of that class. The only exception will be a physical impairment accompanied by a written excuse from a doctor at least one (1) hour prior to show time in which case a current Wyandot county Jr. Fair exhibitor can show the animal. The only exception is an exhibitor with two (2) animals in the same class, then another current Wyandot County Jr. Fair exhibitor can show the second animal. Feed and equipment will be furnished by the exhibitor. Stall space is not to be used for hay, straw, feed or supplies. All large animals, steer, feeder calves, horses, dairy need to be double tied. Pens, aisles, feed and equipment are to be kept neat, clean and orderly. A given exhibit may be shown in only one class except in the case of group livestock classes. No animal may be shown in both the breeding and market classes. All market animals (except poultry) will be weighed prior to the show at the time designated by department superintendents. A one-time reweigh on Sunday night check-in will be allowed for all species that have an under and over weight limit. Showing notice: Any exhibitor pulling their animal from competition once they have entered the show arena or if an exhibitor who stood first in their class does not return for the championship class, the exhibitor will be disgualified from the show and will forfeit all premiums and awards won at the 2024 Wyandot County Fair. All exhibits in the crop and shop classes must have been grown or built since the last fair. All exhibits should be displayed and identified so as to provide ease of inspection. All market beef animals must be properly dehorned, regrowth of 1 inch or less and properly castrated surgically or banded on or before July 15th and their can be no evidence of testicular tissue by August 15th.

Bulls may not be housed in the Jr. Fair Dairy Barn.

All Jr. Fair dairy animals must be properly dehorned or polled, and **regrowth of 1** inch or less.

- There will be veterinarian livestock inspections during the fair. If any livestock are found sick during these inspections, they will be released.
- The Jr. Fair department superintendents reserve the right to interpret and administer department requirements as they see fit as a group.

Mandatory Quality Assurance is required for Livestock Exhibition.

Livestock Interview Judging will be at the discretion of each Jr. Fair organization.

Ohio's Livestock Show Reform Act and Ohio Department of Agriculture Exhibition Rules: 901-19-31 Responsibilities of and Assistance to Jr. Fair Exhibitors.

A Jr. Fair livestock exhibitor shall be responsible for the continuous care, grooming and preparation of the livestock entered in the Jr. Fair Livestock Show.

An exhibitor may receive assistance in the care, grooming and preparation of the livestock entered in the Jr. Fair Livestock Show, provided that the assistance shall be limited to explanation or demonstration provided by the following:

Family members.

Household members.

FFA Advisors or adult volunteers of 4-H or FFA in the exhibitor's club or county. **Vocational Agriculture Instructors.**

County Extension Educator.

Department representatives.

Veterinarians.

Members of the exhibitor's 4-H club, FFA chapter or other youth organization. Guest speakers of 4-H, FFA or other youth organizations.

***MUST REGISTER AT THE JR FAIR OFFICE**

Any person not specified above in this rule who provides assistance to a Jr. livestock show exhibitor shall register in writing with the sponsor. The responsibility to register rest with the exhibitor. An assistant may register for more than one exhibitor. Failure to register constitutes grounds for disciplinary action against the exhibitor. <u>Assistance shall be limited to explanation and minimal demonstration.</u>

901-19-32 Breed Shows or Classes -

In breed shows or classes, the rules of the breed association shall constitute accepted grooming practices for that breed's show or class, unless otherwise modified by a mandatory rule.

901-19-33 Prohibited Grooming Practices -

The following grooming practices are prohibited in market classes, non-breed shows or classes, and breed shows or classes unless those grooming practices are permitted under rule 901-19-32.

Using any substance to enhance or change the color of the livestock, including the livestock's hide or hooves;

Adding any substance externally in buildup, change or alter the shape or conformation of the livestock, including by way of example, but not limited to rope, false hair, graphite, hemp and powders, Slick clipping or body shaving of market hogs except on the ears and tails.

OHIO DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE REQUIRES ALL EXHIBITORS MUST ATTEND A QUALITY ASSURANCE SESSION AT ONE OF THE ABOVE TIMES UNLESS THEY HAVE "TESTED OUT".

Deadline for Quality Assurance is July 15, 2024

- All youth planning to exhibit a market or lactating dairy animal in 2024 must attend one of the above scheduled sessions.
- Wyandot County Jr. Fair market projects that require Quality Assurance training are: market beef, market dairy beef, market swine, market lamb, market goats, market poultry and eggs, market rabbits, beef feeders, dairy feeders, lactating dairy cows and lactating goats. Only Market (meat) Rabbit exhibitors are required to do Quality Assurance, not Pet Rabbit or Breeding Rabbit exhibitors.
- Under the Assurance for Livestock Exhibition Rules, Mandatory Quality Assurance is a prerequisite to exhibit Junior market livestock, lactating dairy cattle and lactating goats.
- First time Jr. Fair exhibitors who plan to exhibit a market or lactating dairy animal in 2024 must attend one of the scheduled sessions. A parent, guardian or responsible adult must attend the training with the first year exhibitor.

Ohio Department of Agriculture requires that all exhibitors annually attend and complete a Quality assurance program. Youth (who are 15 years of age and older and not a first time exhibitor) may take a test based on the appropriate skill level for their age following the Quality Assurance program. Youth who pass the test will be exempt from annual Quality Assurance re-certification until they are no longer a junior exhibitor (nineteen years of age or older on December 31st of their last year).

- Quality Assurance training from another exhibition will be accepted for the Wyandot County Fair the exhibitor must present proof of training to the OSU Extension Office <u>before</u> July 15, 2024.
- A Drug Use Notification Form DUNF must be completed for all junior market livestock, including market poultry, feeder calves, lactating dairy cattle and lactating goats. The DUNF must be reviewed for compliance with mandatory annual attendance or completion of a Quality Assurance Program.
- There will be no "make-up" opportunity for Quality Assurance Training. Exhibitors not receiving the training by July 15, 2024 will be ineligible to exhibit at the 2024 Wyandot County Fair.

Livestock Interview Judging is at the discretion of each Jr. Fair organization.

- 4-H Livestock book judging will be held at the fairgrounds arena on Saturday, August 10, 2024 from 1 p.m. 5 p.m.
- Make-up 4-H Livestock book judging will be held Wednesday, August 7 by appointment only through the Extension Office.

Arrangements must be made with the OSU Extension Office for make-up judging. ***This document supersedes any other rules including the 4-H Handbook.*** Health papers are not required for in-state animals.

A Certificate of Vaccination is required for horses and feeder calves only. This can be filled out by your veterinarian at the time of vaccination and does not require a

visual inspection of the animal within 30 days of the Fair. If you have any concerns about whether or not your animal is healthy for the Fair, you should have the animal examined by a veterinarian prior to the arrival at the Fair. Due to these changes in the health regulations, an animal inspection will be performed as animals enter the fair grounds on Sunday, September 8, beginning at 2 p.m. Any animals showing signs of contagious diseases or poor health will be removed from the grounds. All feeder calf projects will be required to present their certificate of vaccination to the department advisor at weigh-in.

- A veterinary inspection will also be conducted on Monday morning, September 9, 2024. All animals must be in their assigned pens and without body coverings such as blankets and hoods.
- A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (Health Paper) is required on animals from out of state. See the rules and regulations in the Official Fair Premium Book.
- All feeder calves are required to receive 2 vaccinations for IBR, BVD, BRSV, PI3 and Pasteurella. The first official vaccine will be given by a veterinarian on June 1, 2024, at the cost of \$8.00 per calf. The booster vaccine must be given by a veterinarian between July 10 and August 15, 2024. Your veterinarian must sign your Certificate of Vaccination and enter the date that the vaccine was administered. The Certificate of Vaccination will be provided at Weigh-In/Tag Day on June 1, 2024.
- All feeder calves must be castrated surgically or banded on or before July 15, 2024. (No evidence of testicular tissue by August 15th). Calves are to be hornless, meaning they have no horns, no scurs and smooth to the scalp. All cattle must be free of ringworm. Warts are at vet's discretion. Any animals exhibiting these diseases will not be permitted to remain on the fairgrounds.
 - Horses are required to be vaccinated by a veterinarian for equine influenza between March 1 - August 31, 2024. The vaccination for Rhinopneumonitis is at the discretion of the horse's owner. Proof of vaccination will be a completed Certificate of Vaccination. All horse exhibitors must turn in their veterinarian papers to the Horse Department Advisors prior to the fair or the horse will not be permitted to remain on the fairgrounds.
 - Swine will not need a pseudorabies virus test unless from out of state. If your pig was purchased from an out of state source, it must be tested for pseudorabies. The swine show is a non-terminal show.
 - To avoid having to take rabbits or poultry home, have your animals checked for the common diseases mites, cankers, etc. prior to the fair. Poultry and rabbits will be examined when they arrive or soon after.
 - All poultry must be hatched from a NPIP hatchery or from a state certified Pullorum-Typhoid Tested Flock or be tested with a certified Pullorum test prior to September 1st. Pullorum tests are at the owner's expense. *Hatchery papers or a copy of hatchery papers must be turned in at Sunday check-in* for inspection upon entry at the fair to assure birds are from a NPIP hatchery and within the age guidelines and will be checked by the Jr. Fair Department Advisors..
 - All sheep and goats must have an official USDA Scrapie ID Tag or tattoo. Tattooed animals must be accompanied by official Scrapie documentation.
 - Exhibitors are responsible for drug residue in market animals. A drug use notification form (DUNF) must be completed for all Jr. Fair market livestock. Tranquilizers are considered illegal drugs and are not acceptable. Some feeds have medications that will require withdrawal time. Be sure to check for any medications in your animal's feed that may require a withdrawal time.

SHEEP AND GOAT EXHIBITION REQUIREMENTS

From the Ohio Department of Agriculture in order for Ohio to maintain Consistent State Status, Ohio Sheep and Goat Exhibitions will be considered Interstate Commerce.

Requirements for bringing sheep and goats into Ohio for exhibition, sale or breeding:

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection issued within 30 days of the opening date of the exhibition.
- CVI must be signed by the owner and the veterinarian attesting to the following statement: "The sheep/goats in this shipment are not known to be under any movement restrictions because of scrapie."
- Show no evidence of infectious or contagious disease.
- All sheep and goats must be identified with official USDA identification (USDAapproved sheep tags, USDA-approved tattoos or identification in the Scrapie Flock Certification Program).
- If the animal was born after January 1, 2002, it must have official USDA sheep/goat identification and be identified to the flock of birth.
- Identification requirements for sexually intact sheep and goats moving within Ohio for exhibition, including sales:
- Official USDA sheep/goat identification in the form of an approved tag or tattoo.
- If the animal was born after January 1, 2002, it must have official USDA sheep/goat identification and be identified to the flock of birth either by an ear tag or tattoo placed by the owner of the flock of birth, or a tag or tattoo placed by the purchaser.
- The identification requirements for flocks enrolled in the Voluntary Scrapie Flock Certification Program qualify as official USDA identification for exhibition and interstate movement and no other special identification is needed. Ohio sheep and goat wethers that are less than 18 months of age exhibited in Ohio do not require USDA identification.
- "Exhibition" means any public show of animals that is sponsored by or under the control of an Ohio county or independent agricultural society **or** the Ohio State Fair **or** which is assembled for a period that exceeds 36 hours **or** contains animals of origins other than Ohio.
- --- Includes show lamb and goat sales, consignment sales of livestock and jackpot shows.
- Responsibilities of an exhibition sponsor (includes show lamb and goat sales,
- consignment sales of livestock and jackpot shows):

Must have an approved veterinarian.

- Buildings, pens, stalls, rings and other enclosures in which animals are to be quartered for exhibition must be cleaned and disinfected prior to the exhibition under the direction of the approved veterinarian.
- The approved veterinarian is required to:

Examine CVI when required: and

- Inspect livestock for infectious or contagious diseases within a reasonable time of arrival; and
- Inspect livestock daily.
- May order the immediate removal of any animal that, in the opinion of the approved veterinarian, places other animals at unacceptable risk of disease.
- Maintain a record for one year from the date of the exhibition of each animal present at the exhibit. Sheep and goat sale records must be kept for 5 years. (See F below)
- For livestock purchased at an exhibition and moved out of state, an accredited veterinarian must issue a certificate of veterinary inspection before the animal moves across the state line.

The Code of Federal Regulations requires that sheep and goat sale records be kept for 5 years by the seller, the buyer and the exhibition/sale sponsor. The records must contain the following information;

Name and address of the seller, telephone number if available; and Name and address of the buyer, telephone number if available; and Official identification when required as indicated in parts A and B of

Official identification when required as indicated in parts A and B of these requirements; and

PUBLICATION AND ENFORCEMENT OF THE MINIMUM LENGTH OF OWNER-SHIP AND CUSTODY REQUIRED FOR THE RESPECTIVE MARKET CLASS ANIMALS IN ORDER TO QUALIFY FOR EXHIBITING, COMPETING AND PARTICIPATING IN THE RESPECTIVE JR. FAIR LIVESTOCK AUCTIONS.

The Wyandot County Fair reserves the right to dismiss an animal based on the nutritional and well being per the recommendation of the majority vote of the Wyandot County Fair Vet., Advisory Board Department Head, Jr. Fair Coordinator, Sr. Fair Board and the President of the Jr. Fair Board or the Executive / Representative.

JR. FAIR SHOWMANSHIP CLASSES

Each livestock exhibitor is encouraged to enter the showmanship classes. There is no entry form but be sure to check the bulletin board in the departments to see if a sign-up is required.

- Exhibitors must use their project animals which they have shown or will show in other classes in Jr. Fair.
- An exhibitor's age on Jan. 1st of the current year determines the showmanship division the exhibitor participates in.
- There is no limit on the number of showmanship classes an exhibitor can enter or win in one year.
- Exhibitors winning their age division (with the exception of the senior division) have the option of moving up an age division or remaining in that age division the following year(s) until they age out of division.
- Unless noted for the department, exhibitors may show multiple years in senior showmanship, even having won that senior showmanship division previous years.

Fitting includes:

Soundness, condition and quality in case of beef animals, sheep and swine, firmness and uniformity.

Cleanliness, hide, hair, hoofs.

General appearance of animals.

Showing includes:

Appearance of exhibitor and equipment used to show animals. Ability to properly pose animals.

Exhibitor must demonstrate ability to show his animal around ring as directed by judge.

- The Showman of Showmen show is a competition between the representatives of the senior showmanship classes. All senior showmanship division winners in beef feeders, dairy, dairy feeders, dairy beef, goats, horses, market beef or beef breed-ing, poultry, rabbits, sheep and swine departments are eligible to compete. In order to add a livestock species to this list there must be a minimum of 10 exhibitors showing that species in one year. Additions and changes will be made the following year to the livestock list as long as 10 exhibitors are expected that year. The departments will determine how their senior age participant is selected.
- Dress for the contest should reflect proper and appropriate show ring apparel for the specific species represented. The junior fair dress code requirements are pants/ jeans with no holes and full button up shirts, no polos, to be buttoned from bottom to at least two buttons from the collar and tucked in. Dairy and horse exhibitors may have additional dress code requirements. Livestock do not need to be groomed, only presented clean and with appropriate show equipment.
- Should one contestant have won two Senior Showmanship Divisions, they must decide which specie they choose to represent with the runner-up in the other division taking their place. **Contestants must decide within 24 hours of a show if they will represent that species or not to give the runner-up time to prepare.
- Should someone be unable to participate, the runner-up will show. It is the responsibility of the winner to notify the runner-up of their opportunity and let the ag teachers know who is showing** *If the runner up cannot compete, then the third place constant will be provided the opportunity. If the third-place contestant cannot compete, then the species will not be represented in Showman of Showmen for the current year,*

Each participant will sign a release of liability form in order to participate.

- The contest participant will provide their animal and show equipment for the competition in the fair arena at 4:45 p.m. on Saturday of the show. If you feel your animal would not do well in Showman of Showmen and be able to be handled by all contestants, please find a suitable replacement. The poultry division must be represented by a market broiler, no matter what was shown by the winning poultry exhibitor. Animals may be switched out between rotations if needed due to animal fatigue.
- Due to the similarity of the size and style of showmanship between the market beef and dairy beef and the beef feeders and dairy feeders, these exhibitors will only present one of the species for the competition on a rotating basis every two years (even years = market beef and dairy feeder, odd years = dairy steer and beef feeder).

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Contestants will be asked to rotate to different species every five minutes. In addition, one rotation will be a 10 question general knowledge test on the species exhibited and the livestock industry. A second rotation will be public speaking where participants will introduce themselves, tell where they are from, what organization they represent, which species they represent, which species they show, what they like about the fair, what they are most looking forward to showing and most scared of showing, and then any additional comments they would like to make.

- Each judge will rate the participants on a scale of one (1) to ten (10), with ten being the best. The highest cumulative score will win the contest. Each contestant's score on their represented species will not be used in the scoring, though they will begin by showing their represented species. The two species "out" for the year will begin with the general knowledge test and public speaking.
- In order to account for an uneven number of scores for those representing the cattle departments, the beef feeder and dairy feeder participants will not receive a score in either area and the market beef and dairy steer participants will not receive a score in either area as well. This equalizes the number of scores.
- Calculating the deviation in the contestant's scores will break a tie. The highest score will be subtracted from the lowest score, yielding the deviation in the contestant's scores. If a tie still exists, then the tie breaker will be the contestant's score on the general knowledge test.
- A suitable representative of representatives chosen by the Wyandot County Agricultural Education Instructors will judge each division.
- An exhibitor may only win the Showman of Showmen contest one time during their Jr. Fair career. Contestants may participate more than one time depending on senior showmanship eligibility as set by the departments.



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NEW FOR 2024: 1st Year Exhibitor Shared Horse Program

Any exhibitors participating in this program must be a first year horse exhibitor (any age) and share a lease with another Wyandot County exhibitor. The Junior Fair will provide a contract that must be completed by the 1st year exhibitor and the exhibitor they are sharing a lease with **by June 1st.** Exhibitors participating in this program may only participate in two classes (total between Monday and Tuesday).

All other Jr. Fair Horse and Pony exhibitors must show his or her own project. There is no limit on the number of classes for these exhibitors. The number of horses is limited to no more than two horses or combination of horses and ponies per exhibitor. No more than two head per project book entered as long as all other requirements are met. Weanling beside a mare does not count toward combination total.

Horses are over 58", ponies are 58" and under, and Miniatures are 38" and under. Official show height determined in June.

All Jr. Fair horses and ponies must be stalled on fairgrounds for duration of fair. No horses or ponies permitted outside the immediate area of the Jr. Fair horse barn during the county fair. This means horses should be in the barn, wash rack or arena at all times.

No stallions beyond foaling year will be stalled in the Jr. Fair barn or entered in the Jr. Fair classes.

Sawdust bedding for all Jr. Fair horses and ponies will be provided by the Wyandot County Horse Committee. There will be a mandatory **\$10.00** charge per horse which will be collected by 4-H/FFA advisors at the time Jr. Fair entries are completed. Sawdust payment is required to show.

NOTE: In addition to state health regulations, the following health regulations will be enforced by the local fair board upon recommendation of the Wyandot county veterinarian:

Certificate of Vaccination is required and must be presented to the Horse Department Advisors prior to the fair.

Require Equine Influenza

Vaccination to be given between March 1, 2024 and August 31, 2024. The vaccination for

Rhinopneumonitis & Rabies is at the discretion of the horse's owner.

If an exhibitor's project is lost or destroyed for any reason, the project may be exhibited through the development of a poultry poster. An on line entry form must be completed by July 15th. Animals **are not** to be replaced after possession dates.



- Meat pen/fryer rabbits must be entered on Livestock Entry Form by July 15th A maximum of two (2) substitutions per member will be allowed. Substitutions
- must be within the same breed and class as the original entry. Premiums will be paid on the grade an exhibitor receives on each animal. The

A born & raised meat pen will consist of three rabbits from the same breed and variety. They can weigh no less than 3.5 pounds each and no more than 5.5

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pounds each and cannot be over 12 weeks or 84 days old. Only rabbits classified as "meat-type" rabbits should be entered in meat pen and fryer classes.
A born & raised fryer rabbit can weigh no less than 3.5 pounds and no more than 5.5 pounds and cannot be over 12 weeks or 84 days old. Any Born and Raised Meat Pen and Born and Raised Fryer rabbits who are either overweight or underweight can be exhibited but cannot be taken to the show arena for judging. These rabbits also cannot be taken through the sale ring but can be sold at base bid.

The breeding doe/buck must be in the exhibitor's possession by May 15th. Doe must be bred May 15th or after for meat pen to be no more than 84 days old by the Wyandot County Fair.

All born & raised meat pens and born & raised fryers will be weighed on arrival at the Fair by the department superintendents or in the presence of the judge.

To be able to exhibit a born & raised meat pen or born & raised fryer, each exhibitor must exhibit at least one rabbit from their breeding project of one buck or doe of the same breed as the meat pen or fryer.

Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion Born & Raised Meat Pen and Born & Raised Fryers will be selected and they must be sold in the Jr. Fair Livestock Sale. Meat Pen and fryer rabbits may not be shown in any other class.

Only meat pens or a fryer who weigh between 3.5 pounds and 5.5 pounds may be sold at the Jr. Fair Sale. To be able to exhibit a born & raised meat pen or born & raised fryer, each exhibitor must exhibit (bring to the fair) at least one rabbit from their breeding project of one buck or doe of the same breed as the meat pen or fryer.

- All Independent Meat Pen and Independent Fryer rabbits must be tattooed by a Wyandot County Fair designated person with a designated tattoo. These tattoos will be done on the same day as 4-H interview and book judging.
- Each Jr. Fair Exhibitor can tattoo no more than 7 rabbits to be used in their Independent Meat Pen and Independent Fryer exhibits.
- All Independent Meat Pens and Independent Fryers will be weighed on arrival at the Fair by the Department Superintendents or in the presence of the judge.
- Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion Independent Meat Pen and Independent Fryers will be selected and they must be sold in the Jr. Fair Livestock Sale.
- Independent Meat Pen and Independent Fryer rabbits may not be shown in any other class.
- Only meat pens or a fryer who weigh between 3.5 and 5.5 pounds may be sold at the Jr. Fair Sale.

Department Requirements -

No Jr. Fair hogs will be allowed to be shown in the open class Swine Show.

This is a non-terminal show and sale.

Out-of-state hogs follow state fair rules. See state fair rules in the front of this book.

Exhibitors can exhibit barrow/gilt, barrow/barrow, or gilt/gilt at the fair.

- All market hogs will be weighed during Sunday night check-in. One time reweigh will be allowed at 6:45 p.m. on Sunday night for hogs weighing 210-219 lbs. and 291-300 lbs.; with a 3lb allowances permitted. Hogs must be weighed in consecutively at the same time.
- All pigs will be divided into weight classes in the gilt and barrow shows. Market hogs minimum 220 lbs. maximum 290 lbs.
- Animals under or over the minimum and maximum weights will not be considered for champion or reserve champion.
- Over and under weight hogs will have their own class and will be eligible to participate in the Livestock Sale.
- An Overall Champion and Reserve Champion barrow and gilt will be selected.

An Overall Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion Market Hog will be

Selected. Champion and Reserve honors will be awarded at the discretion of the judges.

No cleaning of pens until all hogs are released from the hog barn.

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Nipple Waterers: Allowance of nipple waterers that are no larger than 6 inches in diameter and no taller than 32 inches. There will be no permanent modifications allowed to be made to the gates or pens to allow use of waterer.

No oil or oil based products will be permitted on the fairgrounds, this includes weigh ins and show. Water soluble products are only allowable to wash and clean the swine. Show day is a Water Only Show! This will apply to both the Junior and Open

classes. Anyone who uses prohibited products will be disqualified from showing.

Base bid is allowed due to it being a non terminal show.

No clipping will be permitted in the barn or on the fairgrounds.

Hogs will be kept in the pen they were assigned to so the number on the card matches the ear tag. Under the Livestock Exhibition Rules by the Ohio Department of Agriculture, the

following rules are in effect as of February 15, 2003:

OAC 901-19-33 (D), prohibits the slick clipping or body shaving of market hogs except on the ears and tail. The word "underline" has been removed from this rule.

Even if the sponsor opts out of one or more of the optional tampering rules, the statute prohibits the use of any material, gas, solid or liquid, that conceals, transforms or enhances the true conformation or configuration of all livestock, including by way of example but not limited to rope, false hair, graphite and hemp.

Barn will be closed during judging.

No feeding at the wash area. No cleaning of feed pans at the wash area.

JUNIOR SWINE PRODUCTION CONTEST

Swine Production pigs must be in the member's possession by June 14.

**Mandatory Weigh-in and Tagging will be done on Saturday, June 15 at the Fairgrounds Swine Barn from 9 a.m. – 11 a.m.

Open to all Jr. Fair exhibitors with swine projects. All entries must comply with all department guidelines, to be eligible for Grand and Reserve Grand Champion. Note: Weight guidelines do not apply to Swine Production Contest.

The contest will include rate of gain records and carcass information on two market

pigs - one gilt/one barrow, one gilt/one gilt, or one barrow/one barrow.

Up to 10 (ten) pigs can be weighed and identified by each participant on Saturday,

June 15. The number to be weighed is the choice of the participant. **The pig identification will** include ear tagging, weight and color description of each pig.

Two pigs (one gilt/one barrow, one gilt/one gilt, or one barrow/one barrow) are entered in Class 161 and brought to the fair.

These pigs will be eligible for the Jr. Fair Livestock Sale. **Average of the two

pigs for placing will be determined by amount of lean gain per day.

Lean gain will be determined by ultra sound measurement by a certified technician.

Junior Fair Dress Code -

Requirements for all shows/sale. Pants/Jeans with no holes. Full button up shirts, no polos, to be buttoned from bottom to at least two buttons from the collar and tucked in for all shows/sale. Exhibitor will not be permitted to enter the ring without wearing appropriate attire. Judges will be informed of this dress code. Please check Dairy and Horses for their additional dress code requirements.

The purpose of this sale is to provide a marketing opportunity for small and large animals and animal products. All animals must have been exhibited in the Jr. Fair show in order to be eligible to sell.

Sale/Destination Forms MUST be turn in 1/2 hour after check-in.

Exhibitors may sell **ONE TIME ONLY** in the Jr. Fair Sale, including the gallon of milk. If an exhibitor has more than one Grand or Reserve Grand Champion, they are required to sell **each** Grand or Reserve Grand Champion. The Grand and

Reserve Grand Champions of each species **are required** to sell in the Jr. Fair Livestock Sale. The only exception: Beef Feeders and Dairy Beef Feeders.

The decision to sell an animal cannot be reversed/changed <u>unless</u> an exhibitor's animal wins a Grand Champion or Reserve Grand Champion title later in the week. It is the responsibility of a parent or guardian to contact the sale office on any Grand and Reserve Grand Champion winners no later the 11:59 pm Thursday night of the fair week.

In that situation, the first project signed to sell may sell base bid or be taken home. The exhibitor will only be allowed to change an earlier sale choice 30 minutes fol-

lowing the last species show, **if and only if** a subsequent project wins a **Grand Champion or Reserve Grand Champion Title**. A sale/destination form must be completed for <u>ALL</u> market animals.

Jr. Fair exhibitors planning to sell their animals or participate in the gallon of milk sale must complete a sale entry form a Sunday check-in

Deductions to cover sale expenses will be:

All Livestock – 3%

- All Division Champions and Reserve Division Champions 4%
- All Grand and Reserve Grand Champions 5%
- An exhibitor who wins multiple Grand and Reserve Grand Champions—A cumulative 2% commission will be assessed for each species sold according to the sale order.
- Each exhibitor is responsible for his/her animal until species release time. Buyers will assume risks for the animals following release times.
- Donations will be accepted following the sale of the gallon of milk. These contributors will be recognized at the sale. Anyone else may still donate and be listed and thanked in a newspaper ad provided the 3% commission has been paid to the sale committee.
- In case an animal fails to receive a bid it remains the property of the exhibitor.
- Jr. Fair exhibitors are responsible to see that their animals are in the sale ring at the time they are to be sold. They are also responsible for returning their animal (s) to the barn in proper stall/ pen.
- No decorating of yourself or your animal, other than special awards won by the animal shown or exhibited during the current Fair.
- Jr. Fair Department Royalty for this year's fair may wear their sash and/or crown, but only in the department they represent. The Jr. Fair King and Queen, crowned and reigning for this year's Fair, may wear their sash and or crown to sell any species at this year's Fair only. This is at the discretion of the Sale Committee. Sale Committee has final authority.
- If an exhibitor wishes to donate all or some of their sale proceeds from the Junior Fair Livestock sale to a charitable organization they must obtain a Charitable Contribution Intent Form (CCIF) from the Senior Fair Office. The completed CCIF must be submitted to the Senior Fair Secretary by 5:00 pm 10 days prior to the sale.
- Special Charitable donations will not be announced during the sale and cannot be solicited on the fairgrounds during the week of the fair.
- Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion hogs, beef, sheep and goats will be tagged immediately following champion selection. These animals will be slaughtered at a Sr. Fair Board designated slaughterhouse. Those animals must be slaughtered with procedures to be followed as specifically directed by the Sr. Fair Board. The carcasses will be inspected by either ODA or USDA.

Buyer's Note: All sales must be paid for the day of the sale or within 48 hours or

definite settlement arrangements must be made with the clerk before leaving the arena. Shipping instructions must be put on the bill at the time of settlement. Exhibitors' checks will be held until all buyers' payments have been received.


